



This presentation hopes to provide the audience with a better understanding of one of the most exquisitely lyrical compositions by carefully examining the Italian terms used in this sonetto.

The Fitzwilliam Virginal Book is a collection of almost 300 keyboard works by different composers compiled in the early seventeenth century. These pieces are important as examples of the development of idiomatic keyboard writing in the late Renaissance and early Baroque periods. Though the FVB is frequently cited in keyboard literature courses, this music is rarely heard in live performances. Though originally written for harpsichord, some of these pieces can be effectively performed on piano.

Composing more for the piano than any other instrument, he wrote hundreds of solo and ensemble works demonstrating a gift for melody and a command of miniature forms reminiscent of Schumann. In this workshop we will explore the life and music of this great composer.





Phillip Bush

Conference Recitalist



PHILLIP BUSH is a pianist of uncommon versatility with a repertoire extending from the 16th century to the 21st. While today's music school graduates are being encouraged to diversify their musical interests and experiences, Phillip Bush has been following that kind of eclectic and unconventional career for over thirty years, in a busy career that has taken him to many parts of the globe. Since his New York recital debut at the Metropolitan Museum in 1984, Mr. Bush has appeared as recitalist throughout North America, as well as in Europe, Asia and the Caribbean. He made his Carnegie Hall concerto debut in 2001 with the London Sinfonietta to critical acclaim, replacing an ailing Peter Serkin on short notice in concerti by Stravinsky and Alexander Goehr. He has also appeared as soloist with the Osaka Century Orchestra, Cincinnati Symphony, Houston Symphony and many other orchestras, in repertoire as far-ranging as the Beethoven concerti and the American premiere of Michael Nyman's Harpsichord Concerto.

A much sought-after chamber musician, Mr. Bush has performed and recorded with the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center, appeared frequently on New York's Bargemusic series, and has performed at the Grand Canyon Music Festival, Bridgehampton Chamber Music Festival, Cape Cod Chamber Music Festival, Strings in the Mountains (Colorado), Sitka Music Festival (Alaska), St. Bart's Music Festival (French West Indies) Music at Blair Atholl (Scotland), Vianden Festival (Luxembourg), Fayetteville Chamber Music Festival (TX), Cape May Music Festival and many others. He has appeared with the Kronos, Parker, Jupiter, Miami, Lutoslawski, and Carpe Diem string quartets, and has also performed with members of the Emerson, Guarneri, Tokyo, Orion and St. Lawrence quartets. Between 1991 and 1999, he performed over 250 concerts in Japan as a member of the piano quartet Typhoon, and recorded five CD's with the group for Epic/Sony, all of which reached the top of the Japanese classical charts. From 2007-2015, Mr. Bush served as Artistic Director of the Bennington Chamber Music Conference, a summer program in Vermont for which his responsibilities included curating a six-concert chamber music series each season.

A devoted advocate for contemporary music, Phillip Bush has performed often with many renowned American new music ensembles, including Bang on a Can All-Stars, Southwest Chamber Music, Group for Contemporary Music, Newband, Sequitur, Parnassus and New Music Consort. He is particularly noted for his association with Steve Reich and Musicians and the Philip Glass Ensemble, touring worldwide with those ensembles from 1986 until 2007. From 1995 until 2010 Mr. Bush was a member of the Milwaukee-based new music group, Present Music. His efforts on behalf of contemporary music have earned him grants and awards from the Mary Flagler Cary Charitable Trust, the Aaron Copland Fund, ASCAP, Chamber Music America and the National Endowment for the Arts. His discography as soloist and chamber musician has now reached 40 recordings on labels such as Sony, Virgin Classics, Koch International, ASV, New World Records, Denon and many others.

Mr. Bush is a graduate of the Peabody Conservatory, where he studied with Leon Fleisher. From 2000 to 2004, Mr. Bush taught piano and chamber music at the University of Michigan, and he has also served as Visiting Faculty at the University of North Carolina. Since 2012 he has been a member of the piano and chamber music faculty at the University of South Carolina School of Music.

Pedagogy Headliner

SCOTT MCBRIDE SMITH is a recognized leader in worldwide music education. As the Cordelia Brown Murphy Professor of Piano Pedagogy at the University of Kansas since 2010, he focuses on national issues of teacher training and piano pedagogy. As President and CEO of the International Institute for Young Musicians, he leads a summer program offering specialized training for gifted young performers from around the world. And as co-author of the groundbreaking new series American Popular Piano, he has helped create a course of study for today's student – providing tools that inspire the necessary hard work while playing music they love.

Scott McBride Smith is President of the Music Teachers National Association of the United States. He is Visiting Professor at the Shanghai Conservatory in China, as well as the Sichuan Conservatory and Shanghai Normal University. He is President of the U.S. Music Certification Exams.



Interest in his philosophical and cognitive approach to music teaching has resulted in appearances across the US, Canada, Europe, Asia, Australia, and South America, including workshops and showcases at every Music Teachers National Association Conference since 1999. But he has never lost the ability to see humor in the profession and laugh.

A long-time teacher of prize-winning students in Irvine, California, Dr. Smith's students were the California State Champions for many years between 1988-2009. Former students have been First Prize winners in the Naftsger Competition, Tchai-kovsky Competition, the Bachauer Competition (Juilliard) and in MTNA competitions. A chamber music coach as well as piano teacher, Scott McBride Smith coached the Wakarusa Trio to the 2013 First Place in the MTNA Chamber Music (Strings) national competition. The group went on the win the Coleman-Barstow Prize at the 2014 Coleman Chamber Music Competition.

Dr. Smith is co-author of the college text The Well-Tempered Keyboard Teacher and associate editor of the magazine Clavier Companion. He is co-author of Christopher Norton's Guide to Microjazz.

Dr. Smith has served as Visiting Professor at the Bela Bartok Conservatory in Lima, Peru; at the Hong Kong Academy of Performing Arts; and in Taiwan, sponsored by the International Piano Teaching Foundation.

Scott McBride Smith received his doctorate from the University of Southern California, where he was co-winner of the Outstanding Graduate in Piano award.

Young American pianist, DR. BENJAMIN WARSAW (www.benjaminwarsaw.com) is a classical pianist, composer, teacher, and accompanist, and performs solo and ensemble concerts throughout North America. Recent concert highlights include, Schwartz Center, Emory University, Atlanta, GA; Yamaha Hall and Haydn Birthplace, Vienna, Austria; O'Shaughnessy Theatre, Minneapolis, MN; and Benjamin performed original compositions for President Carter during a live broadcast at the Carter Center. As a student Benjamin studied and performed solo music, chamber music, and original compositions in summer festivals and masterclasses such as, Wiener Masterclasses, Banff Center Piano Master Classes, Brandywine International Piano Festival, International Keyboard Festival at Mannes, and his original compositions have been featured on NPR. Benjamin holds Bachelor and Master of Music degrees from the Eastman School of Music where he studied with Rebecca Penneys. He completed his Doctorate of

Musical Arts in Piano Performance at Boston University under the tutelage of the late Anthony di Bonaventura.

A native of Atlanta, Georgia, Benjamin is currently Assistant Professor at Armstrong State University, Savannah, GA. There, he is chairman of the piano department, teaches piano and other music-related courses, and is founder and Artistic Director of the concert series, Piano in the Arts. During the summers, Benjamin has been on faculty at Boston University Tanglewood Institute, Blue Lake Fine Arts, Chautauqua Institution, and is currently on faculty at Rebecca Penneys Piano Festival during the summer. He is a member of Pi Kappa Lambda, Music Teachers National Association, Savannah Music Teachers Association, and is an ASCAP composer. Recently Benjamin released his debut album, Warsaw plays Warsaw, featuring a set of 24 Preludes of original music for piano. He is honored to be selected as Georgia Music Teacher's Association's 2017 composer of the year.


