

Dr. Julie Knerr Hague teaches piano at her home studio in Windsor, Connecticut. She was formerly on the piano faculty at the Hartt Community Division in West Hartford, Connecticut. Before returning to her home state of Connecticut, Julie taught applied piano, piano pedagogy, and group piano as a faculty member at the University of Missouri, Oklahoma City University, and Ohio University.

Julie holds a PhD in Music Education with an Emphasis in Piano Pedagogy from the University of Oklahoma, where her dissertation on elementary level piano technique was nominated for the Best PhD Dissertation Award in 2006. Additional degrees include MM degrees in Piano Performance and Piano Pedagogy

from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, where Dr. Knerr studied piano and harpsichord; and a BM in Piano Performance from the University of Puget Sound. Her mentors in Piano Pedagogy include Jane Magrath, Barbara Fast, Christos Tsitsaros, and Reid Alexander.

As an accomplished collaborative pianist, Julie enjoys performing with both instrumentalists and singers. Her former piano teachers include Duane Hulbert, James Barbagallo, William Heiles, Timothy Ehlen, and Edward Gates. Julie is a frequent adjudicator at festivals and competitions throughout the United States. Her current research interests include elementary level piano technique, lesser known pre-college piano repertoire, and group piano pedagogy.

PEDAGOGY HEADLINER Katherine Fisher

Katherine Fisher is on the faculty of the Athens Community Music School at Ohio University in Athens, Ohio. Her responsibilities include teaching private piano lessons as well as coordinating the Piano Safari Program (group lessons) for children who are beginners at the instrument.

Katherine Fisher and Dr. Julie Knerr

developed the Piano Safari Method during their time in school together at the University of Oklahoma. While graduate



students, they realized they had a mutual dream of writing a piano method that would incorporate the best elements of the various techniques they had been using in their teaching.

Katherine is a member of the Fisher Piano Duo with husband, Dr. Christopher Fisher. The duo has performed throughout the United States. They are co-authors of the revised and expanded edition of Piano Duet Repertoire (Indiana University Press, 2016). A native of Ohio, Katherine received her degrees from the University of Oklahoma (MM in Piano Performance and Pedagogy) and the Wheaton College Conservatory of Music (BM in Piano Performance). Her former teachers include Jeongwon Ham, Jane Magrath, Barbara Fast, Karin R. Edwards, and Nancy Bachus.





COMMISSIONED COMPOSER Terry Lowry



Terry Lowry is the composer of over 200 works, including piano concertos, oratorios, symphonies, chamber works, song cycles and numerous works for solo instrument, especially piano. His iTunes podcast, "Tone Poem", through which he often releases new compositions, has subscribers in over 100 countries.

As both pianist and conductor, Mr. Lowry maintains a very busy performing schedule. A Steinway Artist, he has performed over 600 solo piano recitals throughout North America and Europe and he has appeared over 300 times on the podium in the United States, Germany, Austria, Spain, and Italy. He is the Conductor and Music

Director of the Carroll Symphony Orchestra, the Carroll Community Wind Ensemble and the Carrollton Jazz Orchestra. He is also the Organist-Choirmaster at St. Timothy's Episcopal Church in Atlanta, and the pianist of the chamber ensemble Atlanta by Six. He has released 15 albums and will release a new album of piano works by Franz Liszt this summer.

In 2012 he co-founded the online community Musical Overture and continues to serve as its CEO. He is the Creator and Executive Producer of the public television series, "Hear Us", which premiered across North America in 2018, and he worked as producer on over 50 episodes of the syndicated radio program "The Hymn of the Week with Larry Frazier".

He is the volunteer chairperson of the Harmonies for Healing music therapy program at Tanner Medical Center and volunteers each week at Carrollton Elementary and Sharp Creek Elementary Schools, teaching music to PreK students. He lives with his wife, Tara, and their four children in Carrollton, a suburb of Atlanta.

Carrollton Jazz Orchestra

The Carrollton Jazz Orchestra is a twenty piece jazz band in residence at the Center for the Arts in Carrollton, Georgia. Constructed in the traditional instrumentation of the "big band", with saxophone, trombone, trumpet and rhythm sections augmented as need by additional reeds, brass and percussion, the CJO is a collective of selected musicians including soloists, ensemble players and composer/arrangers who value the creative opportunity to rehearse and perform challenging and complex jazz in the context



of a contemporary jazz orchestra format. Our musicians come from a broad spectrum of musical and personal backgrounds including professional musicians (both civilian and military), music educators and other professionals, all of whom share a love and respect for this music. Our members have played virtually every genre of music from the sacred to the profane, in virtually every type of musical ensemble from chamber orchestras to funk bands, and in virtually every venue from international concert halls to nightclubs (complete with chicken wire protecting the stage).

The CJO is part of an ongoing partnership between the Carroll Symphony Orchestra and the Carrollton Center for the Arts, which includes the CSO, CJO, the Carroll Community Wind Ensemble and the CSO Music Academy.

The Carrollton Jazz Orchestra is available for performance engagements.





CONFERENCE RECITALIST Wendy Warner




Wendy Warner soared to international attention in 1990, winning top prize at the International Rostropovich Cello Competition at age eighteen. Her career took off with concerts conducted by Mstislav Rostropovich and debuts in Frankfurt, Stuttgart, Köln, Düsseldorf, Berlin and New York at Carnegie Hall. A Chicagoan from a musical family, Warner studied with Rostropovich at the Curtis Institute of Music from which she graduated. She has collaborated with prominent conductors Vladimir Spivakov, Christoph Eschenbach, Andre Previn, Jesús López Cobos and Michael Tilson Thomas, among others. And has appeared with leading U.S. orchestras and internationally—from Paris and London to Serbia and Russia.

Warner, as a part of the Beethoven Project Trio, played the 2009 world premiere of a newly discovered Beethoven piano trio.

She and pianist Irina Nuzova recently performed the complete

Beethoven cello sonatas on tour, with a special appearance at the U.S. Supreme Court. Other collaborators have been Vadim Gluzman, Gideon Kremer, the Fine Arts Quartet and Chicago Chamber Musicians. Warner, who has given recitals in Milan and Tokyo, is a frequent guest on WFMT in Chicago.

Hailed by *Strings* magazine for her "youthful, surging playing, natural stage presence and almost frightening technique," Wendy Warner can be heard on recordings for Cedille, including *Haydn & Myslivecek*; *Russian Music for Cello & Piano*; *Popper & Piatigorsky*; *Double Play*; and *Eclipse*. She has recorded Hindemith's chamber works on Bridge Records; Barber's Cello Concerto for Naxos; and compositions by Dalit Warshaw on Albany Records. An Avery Fisher Career Grant recipient, Warner holds the Leah D. Hamer Distinguished Faculty Chair at the Schwob School of Music, Columbus State University. She plays a 1772 Joseph Gagliano cello.



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CONFERENCE RECITALIST Henry Kramer

Praised by *The Cleveland Classical Review* for his "astonishingly confident technique" and *The New York Times* for "thrilling [and] triumphant" performances, pianist **Henry Kramer** is developing a reputation as a musician of rare sensitivity who combines stylish programming with insightful and exuberant interpretations. In 2016, he garnered international recognition with a Second Prize win in the Queen Elisabeth Competition in Brussels. Most recently, he was awarded a 2019 Avery Fisher Career Grant by Lincoln Center one of the most coveted honors bestowed on young American soloists.

Kramer began playing piano at the relatively late age of 11 in his hometown of Cape Elizabeth, Maine. One day, he found himself entranced by the sound of film melodies as a friend played them on the piano, inspiring him to teach himself on his family's old upright. His parents enrolled him in lessons shortly thereafter, and within weeks, he was playing Chopin and Mozart.

Henry emerged as a winner in the National Chopin Competition in 2010, the Montreal International Competition in 2011 and the China Shanghai International Piano Competition in 2012. In 2014 he was added to the roster of Astral Artists, an organization that annually selects a handful of rising stars among strings, piano, woodwinds and voice candidates. The following year, he earned a top prize in the Honens International Piano Competition.



Kramer has performed "stunning" solo recital debuts, most notably at Alice Tully Hall as the recipient of the Juilliard School's William Petschek Award, as well as at Amsterdam's Concertgebouw. At his Philadelphia debut, Peter Dobrin of *The Philadelphia Inquirer* remarked, "the 31-year-old pianist personalized interpretations to such a degree that works emerged anew. He is a big personality."

A versatile performer, Kramer has soloed in concertos with the Bilkent Symphony Orchestra, Shanghai Philharmonic Orchestra, Indianapolis Symphony and the Calgary Philharmonic Orchestra, among many others, collaborating with conductors such as Marin Alsop, Gerard Schwarz, Stéphane Denève, Jan Pascal Tortelier and Hans Graf. Upcoming performances in the 2019-20 season include a return engagement with the National Orchestra of Belgium performing Beethoven's Concerto No. 4, as well as debuts with the Columbus and Hartford Symphony Orchestras playing Rachmaninoff's Piano Concerto No. 3.

His love for the chamber music repertoire began early in his studies while a young teenager. A sought-after collaborator, he has appeared in recitals at the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center, the Mainly Mozart Festival, the Mostly Mozart Festival, and La Jolla Music Society's Summerfest. His recording with violinist Jiyoon Lee on the Champs Hill label received four stars from *BBC Music Magazine*. This year, *Gramophone UK* praised Kramer's performance on a recording collaboration (Cedille Records) with violist Matthew Lipman for "exemplary flexible partnership." Henry has also performed alongside Emmanuel Pahud, the Calidore and Pacifica Quartets, Miriam Fried, as well as members of the Berlin Philharmonic and Orchestra of St. Luke's.

Teaching ranks among his greatest joys. Since 2018, Kramer has held the L. Rexford Distinguished Chair in Piano at the Schwob School of Music at Columbus State University in Columbus, Georgia. Throughout his multifaceted career, he has also held positions at Smith College and the University of Missouri Kansas City Conservatory of Dance and Music.

Kramer graduated from the Juilliard School where he worked with Julian Martin and Robert McDonald. He received his Doctorate of Musical Arts from the Yale School of Music under the guidance of Boris Berman. His teachers trace a pedagogical lineage extending back to Beethoven, Chopin and Busoni. Kramer is a Steinway Artist.

American Composers Orchestra, Philharmonia Virtuosi,
Naples Philharmonic, Syracuse Symphony, San Francisco
Contemporary Music Players, Florida Lakes Symphony,

Music from China, Stony Brook Summer Music Festival, PAI Festival Orchestra, Da Capo Chamber Players, Washington Square Contemporary Music Society, Delaware Symphony Orchestra, and has served as an assistant to James Levine at the Metropolitan Opera. He served as the Associate Conductor for Broadway productions of *Candide* and *The Gershwins' Fascinating Rhythm*, the Music Director of the Colonial Symphony and NY Concerti Sinfonietta. His discography includes 53 commercially released recordings on the Telarc, Koch, Mode, CRI, Albany, Tzadick, Naxos, Argo, Decca, Delos, Deutsche-Grammaphon, New World, Polygram, Pro-Arte, RCA Victor, Sony Classical, and Warner Brothers labels, and these have received numerous honors including a Grammy Award, a Downbeat Critics Award, five stars for performance in the BBC Music Magazine, two NY Times Top Five annual listings, and a best of 2014 in Fanfare Magazine. His book, *OnMusic Conducting: Connect to the Sound*, published by Connect4Education has been adopted by over 25 universities nationally, and he is a frequent conductor of honor orchestras around the world. He also gives speeches on effective leadership strategies with institutes such as the Jim Blanchard Leadership Forum along with Steve Wozniak, founder of Apple, Inc. He lives in Columbus, GA with his wife Elizabeth and daughters Vivian and Asha.
