The Executive Board of Georgia Music Teachers Association met via Zoom. Joy Poole called the meeting to order at 11:05 a.m.

PRESIDENT: Jan Adams, NCTM

Welcome to our Zoom GMTA Executive Board Meeting. My thanks to Joy Poole for filling in for me today. I double booked this meeting with a Ladies' Day at church where my daughter is the guest speaker! And Mimi needs to keep the new grandson.

2020 has been a year filled with changes but GMTA has excelled through the Covid crisis. The 2020 Spring Auditions were immediately switched to virtual under the expert leadership of Past President, Joy Poole. She and Mandy Reynolds worked tirelessly to provide GMTA members with the opportunity for their students to continue the Audition process through video recordings of the

Region and State Auditions. GMTA led the way for other states, and even MTNA, to model their competitions and auditions using Georgia's process. As a result, Georgia was chosen to be MTNA's 2021 State Affiliate of the Year. I think this is a first for GMTA!

Another first was Dr. Peter van Zandt Lane being chosen as MTNA Distinguished Composer of the Year. Congratulations to Dr. Lane! His presentation at the MTNA Conference was outstanding.

I attended the 2021 MTNA Virtual Conference. One of the nice things about being virtual is that we can continue watching sessions until August. You can also see many more sessions than you would have if it had been live. I am looking forward to attending the 2022 MTNA Conference in Minneapolis, MN on March 26-30, 2022.

As of March 11, 2021, GMTA has 557 members; 92 certified teachers. Our membership in 2020 was 634 members and our membership in 2019 was 677 members. We have 7 Collegiate Chapters.

Our conference is scheduled for November 4-6, 2021 at Piedmont College in Demorest, Ga. Kristi Heflen and Jeri-Mae Astolfi have been working to make the 2021 Conference a memorable one in the N. Georgia mountains. Kristi has scheduled Jasmin Arakawa of University of Florida and Martha Hilley, MTNA President as headliners. We are excited to be together in 2021.

We held our 2020 MTNA Auditions in October with 108 entrants which was up from 2019 with 76 entrants. GMTA was represented with 16 winners from the state MTNA Competitions at the MTNA Southern Division Competitions. At the Southern Division GMTA had 2 winners and 3 alternates including:

(March 31, 2021 Financial Summary) The 2020-2021 GMTA Financial Summary lists the income and expenses for this fiscal year as of March 31, 2021. The second column lists the actual amounts on March 31. Our total income so far is \$62,638.80. Our total expenses so far this year are \$47,244.23. The third column lists the budgeted amounts for 2020-2021, and the last column compares our revenues and expenses as of March 31, 2021 to March 31, 2020. On the second page, there are the explanations for the miscellaneous income and expenses. At the bottom of the page, the balances are listed for our checking account and savings account. The savings account also includes our four named award funds. The balance for each award fund is also listed.

(2021-2022 Budget) The Proposed 2021-2022 Budget lists the income and expenses anticipated for the 2021-2022 fiscal year. The second column lists the budgeted amounts for this fiscal year, the third column lists the projected amounts for this fiscal year, and the fourth column lists the proposed amounts for 2021-2022. REPORTS of COMMITTEE CHAIRS:

ART AWARENESS & ADVOCACY: Debra Hughes, NCTM

ADVOCACY: Advocacy is about educating and informing elected officials, the public, and the media about the importance of the performing arts. Here are some ideas that MTNA suggests:

- **Performance in a public venue, especially in unexpected or informal venues: street performances in a downtown shopping area; outdoor park concert; performance at a prison, community center, hospital lobby, senior citizen residence, museum or art gallery; or faith-based venue.
- **Festival or competition, such as a Bach festival for students of any instrument that features an afternoon of music games and activities organized by university students.
- **A fundraising or charity-based event, such as a studio team for Relay for Life or donation of music lessons to a silent auction.
- **Participation in city-based events, such as a studio entry in a local parade or a booth at a city festival that promotes the benefits of arts education.
- **Projects with community partners or association in the local Chamber of Commerce or civic group events.

I had mini-recitals - 30minutes long - and invited my entire neighborhood. I drew circles on the driveway for social distancing and outfitted my garage as a concert venue. Every 45 minutes I had a handful of students perform their Festival music in the open-air forum. The audience, some of whom were seated while others were walking by, was very pleased. Everyone said how important that day of music was to them. It was positive and public. It was Arts Advocacy in Action.

If every GMTA teacher EACH would commit to just one public positive performance/project a year, it too would strengthen our Arts Advocacy in GA. Can we think of one way we each can do something and do it!?

Question? Is there some way GMTA could actively promote a "Each teacher for one advocacy act per year" idea?

AWARENESS: Book recommendation: "ARTS AWARENESS" by Patricia Hoy. (performer, conductor) who shares real life stories that uncover the power that can come from making music and art. "Arts Awareness" offers a fresh perspective and new ways for everyone to reach out and interact with the world. Music advocacy organizations along with teachers and parents will discover new ways to promote the value of the arts.

GEORGIA'S OWN listing online was updated in November 2020. No new teachers were added but some updated their information. We currently have 18 GMTA teachers who are willing to present 58 different topics. GMTA encourages all of their MTA chapters to utilize their expertise at local meetings.

CERTIFICATION: Robin Engleman, NCTM

As of March 31, 2021, GMTA has a membership of 560 and of those, 89 are nationally certified. I am aware of one teacher who is currently working toward MTNA Certification through the Teacher Profile Projects. I encourage you, if you are not nationally certified, to explore the possibility of becoming certified, either by doing the Teacher Profile Projects or through Administrative Verification.

I have three degrees in piano performance and am tenured at a public university, but I chose to become certified because I wanted the credential granted by one of this country's oldest and foremost teaching organizations. Obtaining MTNA Professional Certification publicly acknowledges my years of training and experience and demonstrates my commitment to continued excellence in teaching.

COMMISSIONING: Jeri-Mae Astolfi, NCTM

The 2020 GMTA Commissioned Composer, Dr. Peter Van Zandt Lane, was selected as the 2020 MTNA Distinguished Composer of the Year. Dr. Lane and his composition, nodes.branches.loops (written for and performed by the Fuego [Saxophone] Quartet), were honored during the MTNA 2021 Virtual Conference.

The 2021 GMTA Commissioned Composer Award was granted to Garrison Gerard, a native of Georgia who is currently pursuing graduate studies at the University of North Texas. Mr. Gerard proposed to write a 12-minute acoustic work for Flute, Clarinet, Violin, Cello, and Piano. The style will build on contemporary developments such as minimalism, spectralism, and nature music, while exploring new areas and creating an innovative composition. He proposes to carry out field recordings specifically for this project in Georgia's distinct ecosystems, including the Appalachian foothills, downtown Atlanta, and the barrier islands. These sounds will form the basis of the piece. The piece will be fully acoustic; the recordings will inform the piece through carrying out spectral analysis on the recordings and as a general inspiration.

THEORY: Diane Boyd

Big changes were made to the GMTA Theory testing area this year. I (Diane Boyd) assumed the job of Theory Chairman and Trudi Norman assumed the job of GMTA Theory administrator. Trudi did a great job of getting the tests ready for testing in the fall and for the first time the tests were e-mailed to the LA Theory Chairmen. The GATE tests were not given this year due to the inability to find safe testing areas during the pandemic. Decision on the 2021-2022 GATE tests will be made later this year.

My vision is to increase the number of GMTA tests in the coming years so that it makes it easier for students to learn more gradually and so teachers don't have to present so much new material from one test to another. Many teachers have expressed dissatisfaction with the GATE tests because the same level test is given to students in three different years. I am forming a committee to study what can be done to correct these issues. I ask that anyone who is interested in joining the committee, or in making comments or suggestions to it, contact me:

WELLNESS: Debra Dickensheets

COVID – 19 UPDATE: COVID – 19 illness hit Georgia in March 2020 and remains a serious health problem now in the spring and summer of 2021. Fortunately, the high peaks of illness seen previously, especially in January 2021, are not present now. Cases have decreased to levels summer 2020 although there remain hotspots in other parts of the country. However, case numbers remain elevated in younger people (our students!) so we need to remain vigilant. We have learned that COVID-19 spreads between people who are in close contact, through respiratory droplets or small particles produced when an infected person coughs, talks or breathes. Indoor environments with poor ventilation increase the risk of transmission.

So, prevention guidelines have focused on the following:

- Handwashing with soap and water or alcohol-based hand rub, and do it often
- Masking of both nose and mouth
- Maintaining at least a 6-foot distance from a person coughing or sneezing
- Maximizing ventilation
- Allowing fresh air to enter the room, if possible
- Minimize close contact
- Clean high touch areas daily or more often as needed
- Monitor your health and be alert for symptoms

Studies have shown that utilizing these prevention measures decreases the spread of COVID - 19. In addition, vaccine usage has decreased the spread of the virus. Transmission is greatly decreased in people who have received the vaccine. The CDC has relaxed some of the guidelines of prevention for vaccinated people as more information becomes available. There are now three COVID - 19 vaccines in the US that have received Emergency Use Authorization and are in usage. As more safety information becomes available, younger age groups will be able to receive the vaccine. We are hopeful that as more of the population is vaccinated and, over time, COVID - 19 cases decrease to low levels, precautions can be relaxed further and we can return to normal teacher-student relations.
