2021 CONFERENCE HIGHLIGHTS



Pedagogy Headliner Martha Hilley, Immediate Past-President of MTNA, 2014 MTNA Teacher of the Year, and National Conference on Keyboard Pedagogy's 2017 Lifetime Achievement Award winner. Hilley joined the faculty of the University of Texas in 1982 and later became Associate Director of the School of Music and Director of Undergraduate Studies. Topics for her three sessions (one on Thursday, two on Friday) are

- 1. "Theory and Improvisation: Think Grilled Cheese and Tomato Soup You Can Have One Without the Other, But It's Just Never As Good!"
- 2."Are Your Students Getting Their Money's Worth Out of Their Repertoire?" (creative ways to use repertoire)
- 3. "Don't Forget to Light <u>Both</u> Ends of the Candle!" (widening your scope of students).

Conference Recitalist Jasmin Arakawa, University of Florida. Dr. Arakawa is a graduate of Tokyo University of the Arts, and holds a Doctor of Music and Master of Music Degrees in Piano Performance from Indiana University where she studied with Emile Naoumoff, the last protégé of Nadia Boulanger. She has performed widely in North America, Central and South America, Europe, China, and Japan. She has also been heard in Carnegie Hall, Salle Gaveau in Paris, and Victoria Hall in Geneva, as well as in broadcasts of the BBC and Radio France. On Friday night after the banquet Dr. Arakawa will perform a concert of solo piano music by a variety of composers, including Johann Christian Bach, Beethoven, Chopin, Albeniz, Faure, Florence Price, and Joshua Uzoigwe.





Commissioned Composer Garrison Gerard, University of North Texas. A composer of electroacoustic and concert music and an ardent collaborator, Gerard has been commissioned by ensembles and soloists, including Andrew Cook, Spencer Byrd, Avenue C Project, Atelier Piano Quartet, and Amorosa String Trio. His music has been presented internationally in performances by [Mod]ular Ensemble, Fort Worth Symphony, and Nu Atmosphere Ensemble. His composition for GMTA is titled "Evaporating Echoes" and is scored for flute, clarinet, violin, cello, and piano. Gerard holds a masters in music composition from UNT, a bachelors in piano from Harding University, and is currently a PhD candidate at UNT serving as a composition teaching fellow.

COMMISSIONED COMPOSER INTERVIEW

JERI-MAE ASTOLFI, NCTM, GMTA COMMISSIONING CHAIR



This year, GMTA is excited to welcome Garrison Gerard as our 2021 GMTA Commissioned Composer. I am excited to share the following interview as a further introduction and to pique your interest in hearing his new work at the conference.

Tell us about your musical background - do you have a primary instrument, when did you begin lessons? Why?

I started taking violin lessons in first grade, and then I picked up trumpet, piano, and a few other instruments through middle and high school. I took lessons on trumpet and piano through high school as I was auditioning for all-state band and wanted to get better at playing—it was in these lessons that I learned most of my music theory and even began composing a little bit. In college I studied piano, and that has been my primary instrument since then.

When did you start composing and what drew you to composition?

I doodled some musical ideas and wrote some songs beginning in high school, I always enjoyed improvising and making up music, but it wasn't until college that I realized that composing was something that people did as a degree or a career. I was drawn to the idea that I could create something that other musicians would interface and interact with—the whole collaborative process is what I was always most interested in.

Were any particular composers influential in your development as a composer?

There are so many composers that have influenced me or shaped the music I write: some of the older composers that I really admire are Bach, Shostakovich, and Stravinsky. The most influential composers are those that changed my perspective on what music can be, those like Salvatore Sciarrino, John Cage, Elaine Radigue, and others that approach music and sound from a unique vantage point.

How would you describe your compositional style?

I like to think of my music as exploring fields of sound and creating gestures through music. I use extended techniques and incorporate noise elements in my piece. I'm usually not overly concerned with the exact pitches or rhythms, but am more focused on the effect of all the constituent parts and on how I can convey my ideas to an audience.

Do you have a routine or specific creative style when creating a new work?

My process can be chaotic at times, and it varies from piece to piece, but when I'm writing I often focus on what I want to say or what is inspiring the work, and try to allow that inspiration to lead me. So if I'm writing a piece about nature I will go out into nature, do some field recordings, and reflect on the sounds I hear there. Sometimes I've written pieces about a scientific or mathematic idea, so I will spend a lot of time reading or thinking about those concepts. The actual composing process is a combination of sketching ideas at paper, sitting at a piano trying some things out, and notating the music into the notation software. There are times where its a struggle to get even a single pitch out, and others where ideas just flow freely.

Do you compose in styles other than contemporary classical?

I enjoy writing in lots of different styles when I have time! I have written some pieces in an ambient or lo-fi aesthetic, and I would enjoy exploring that more. I have composed some film scores, but most of the music I've done for these films has been in a mostly contemporary classical style.

What was the inspiration behind your GMTA/MTNA commission "Evaporating Echoes"?

The piece I wrote for GMTA/MTNA is intimately tied to Georgia and specific places around the state. For this piece I used recordings from across the state, and then analyzed them in a variety of ways. Many of the pitches used in the piece are derived from the sounds of wind in the trees, the water at Amicalola Falls, or the traffic in downtown Atlanta. There are also some animal calls that I used almost verbatim in the piece.

The second layer to the piece is the concept of resonance; I'm really interested in how sounds persist for a time after they initially sound. I was inspired specifically by the way that sound echoes across the valleys in North Georgia. I took this idea and explored what it would sound like if these echoes were stretched, distorted, reversed, or otherwise changed. So throughout the piece, one instrument may make a sound that is then echoed by others instruments and transforms as it reverberates around the ensemble, or there may be an echo without an initial sound or vice versa. These echoes overlap and weave together to form the foundation of much of the piece.

What was the most artistically-stretching (out of your comfort zone) project you have been involved with?

Working with a choreographer was an experience well outside what I was used to doing. It was a constant balancing act in trying to figure out the right relationship between the music's sound and the dancer's movement, but it was a very rewarding way to compose and the result was much greater than the sum of its parts.

I try to have every piece challenge me in some way—there is a general sound I write in and figures that I tend to use more often, but I try to develop and evolve slightly with every piece by incorporating new ideas.

What challenges have you faced as a composer?

Being a composer is incredibly rewarding, but it can be challenging in a number of ways. Perhaps my biggest challenge is believing that my music is worthy of an audience. I love writing music and exploring these ideas that are fascinating to me, and it can sometimes be hard to trust that others will be excited to hear that as well. There have also been plenty of logistical and practical challenges to composing music that I am still tackling.

What advice would you give to instrumental or voice teachers who would like to incorporate composition activities into their lessons but who do not have a composition background?

I would say that all composing starts with listening. Challenging students to see how many sounds they can hear at one time—even in their classroom, out on the playground, or in their own home, asking them how do these sounds change when they move their body or cover their ears, or even having them imagine sounds is a great start. Finding ways to open a students ears to the sounds all around them begins to put them into a different mind set. Following that, if there are ways for the student to begin creating sound, whether that be improvising or asking the student to come up with an idea for how many ways they use a single sound or pitch in a piece, anything that gets them using their creative voice. It doesn't have to be on traditional musical instruments either (can they compose a whole piece using just a rock for example). Composing doesn't have to just be writing notes down, improvisation or imagination of music is just as important. The process of writing out music is all about communication: how can you express your ideas in such a way that a performer would understand what you are going for.

What advice would you give to young people who aspire to compose?

It's never too early to start, and your voice is important. The barriers to being an accepted academic composer can seem really high, but if you enjoy composing begin imagining and jotting down ideas however you know how. Whether that's on staff paper, or just recording yourself on your phone. Listen to what others have to say through music and begin thinking about how you can add to that conversation.

Now that your GMTA/MTNA commission has been created, what's next?

My next work will be written as part of Composing in the Wilderness, a two week field course in Alaska where we will hike through Denali National Park and compose a piece in three days for the Fairbanks Summer Arts Festival. After that, I hope to explore a few ideas that I've been considering, including one inspired by my work on the GMTA/MTNA commission—I want to explore further the concepts of resonance that I broached in the piece through an electronic work where sounds persist for incredibly long amounts of time and build up to create huge sound masses.

- March 21, 2022: Registration Deadline for GMTA State Auditions













North Fulton MTA




WELLNESS REPORT

DEBRA RAMSEY DICKENSHEETS. GMTA WELLNESS CHAIR

Our summer newsletter included an update on Covid from my husband, David Dickensheets, MD, who is currently Medical Director of Epidemiology for Northside Hospital. We all need to keep a close watch on CDC guideline changes. Unfortunately, as you've likely seen in the news, the game has changed once again with the prevalence of the Delta variant throughout the US and the rise in breakthrough cases among vaccinated individuals. There is currently an ongoing spike of cases in our area.

Therefore, it is recommended that **everyone** wear masks while working in our studios and anywhere indoors when we're in close contact with each other and the general public. This goes for both vaccinated and unvaccinated individuals. Of course, we need to continue to sanitize hands and instruments as well as practice social distancing in our studios.

Everyone is encouraged to please exercise as much caution as possible to mitigate potential exposure to the virus for the sake of your students, colleagues, and their families. Based on information provided by the CDC, even if someone is vaccinated and exposed to the virus while masked, they should be tested out of caution and isolate themselves if the test comes back positive. Getting vaccinated reduces the likelihood of severe illness, hospitalization, and death.







The Nolting Award in Composition was established in 1987 and initially funded by beloved GMTA member Betty Nolting. It is given at the GMTA Conference each year to first-place winners in the MTNA Student Composition Competitions for the state-level competitions in each age category.

The Broadhurst Award in Piano was established in 1992 by the Broadhurst family in commemoration of Joan Broadhurst. This award is presented annually at the GMTA conference to the winner of the MTNA Junior and Senior Piano Performance Competition.

The GMTA General Award Fund, established in 1993, includes honorary and memorial gifts and is awarded at the discretion of the GMTA Finance Advisory Committee. Awards from this fund are given to senior string, vocal, and brass/woodwind winners of GMTA auditions. Donations not designated for a specific fund go into this fund.

The Betty H. White Award Fund was established in 2019 by the White family in commemoration of Betty H. White. This fund includes honorary and memorial gifts and is awarded at the discretion of the GMTA Finance Advisory Committee. This award is presented annually at the GMTA Conference to one of the GMTA Teacher Grant recipients for a student in financial need.
