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Jasmin Arakawa

Conference Recitalist

Hailed by *Gramophone* for her 'characterful sparkle', **JASMIN ARAKAWA** has performed widely in North America, Central and South America, Europe, China and Japan. A prizewinner of the Jean Françaix International Music Competition, she has been heard at Carnegie Hall, Salle Gaveau in Paris and Victoria Hall in Geneva, as well as in broadcasts of the ABC Australia, BBC, CBC, PBS and Radio France. She has appeared as a concerto soloist with the Philips Symfonie Orkest in Amsterdam, Orquestra Sinfonica de Piracicaba in Brazil, and numerous orchestras in the United States and her native Japan. Other performance highlights include guest artist appearances at the Toronto Summer Festival,



Ribadeo International Music Festival in Spain, Bicentenaire de Chopin in Switzerland, Scotiabank Northern Lights Music Festival in Mexico, Festival de Música de Cámara in Peru, Festival Internacional de Música Erudita de Piracicaba in Brazil, Dame Myra Hess Concert Series in Chicago and Distinguished Concerts International in New York.

She has a special interest in Spanish repertoire, which grew out of a series of lessons with Alicia de Larrocha. As a prizewinner of the Competition in the Performance of Music from Spain and Latin America and under the sponsorship of the Spanish Embassy, she subsequently recorded solo and chamber pieces by Spanish and Latin American composers.

Arakawa has collaborated with notable artists including cellists Zuill Bailey, Colin Carr and Gary Hoffman, flutists Jean Ferrandis, Marina Piccinini and Carol Wincenc, clarinetist James Campbell, and the Penderecki String Quartet. In addition, she has served as Collaborative Pianist in Residence at the Banff Centre in Canada for three seasons.

Arakawa is a graduate of Tokyo University of the Arts, and holds Doctor of Music and Master of Music degrees in Piano Performance from Indiana University Jacobs School of Music, where she studied with Emile Naoumoff, the last protégé of Nadia Boulanger. A recipient of the 2016 Steinway Top Teacher Award, Arakawa has given master classes at China Conservatory of Music in Beijing, Conservatorio Nacional de Música in Peru, Instituto Baccarelli in Brazil, and numerous universities in North America and Europe. A sought-after adjudicator, Arakawa has served on the juries of international and national competitions, including the International Chopin Piano Competition for Latin American Pianists in Peru, and New Orleans Piano Institute Competition. Jasmin Arakawa is Assistant Professor of Piano and Piano Area Coordinator at the University of Florida, and the Director of the UF International Piano Festival.

Martha Hilley

Pedagogy Headliner

MARTHA HILLEY joined the faculty of The University of Texas School of Music in 1982 as coordinator of group piano and a member of the piano pedagogy faculty. Over the next 36 years she served two years as head of the keyboard division, five years as Associate Director of the School of Music as well as two different five-year terms as Director of Undergraduate Studies. Martha retired from the Butler School of Music on August 31, 2019.

Over the last 49 years in higher education, Ms. Hilley has been an active participant in workshops, conferences and seminars on the international, national, state and local levels. She has been co-curriculum coordinator with Lynn Freeman Olson and presenter for the International Pedagogy Workshops in Italy, Belgium, Norway, Australia, Austria and Hawaii and served as pedagogy faculty for the Fairbanks Summer Arts Festival in Alaska and Tunghai University's Summer Keyboard Institute in Taichung, Taiwan. She was keynote speaker and presenter for the 2013 Encontro Internacional de Piano ed Grupo in Goiania, Brazil. In September of 2014, Hilley was fortunate enough to be an attendee at the Polofonia Conference held at the Royal Conservatory



of the Hague. The theme of the conference was "The Musician as Creative Entrepreneur." In more recent years Martha has been a co-presenter at CEPROM, a pre-conference meeting to ISME and a co-presenter at the following ISME Conference in Glasgow, Scotland. She was also a keynote speaker at the 2018 SEMPRE Conference in London, England.

Professor Hilley's abilities as a teacher were recognized in 1983 when she received the Texas Excellence Teaching Award, and again in 1988 when she was awarded one of four university-wide Dad's Association Centennial Fellowships for excellence in undergraduate teaching. In 1992, Professor Hilley was recipient of the prestigious Orpheus Award presented by Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia in recognition of her contributions to the field of music. In 1997, she was awarded the Outstanding Collegiate Teacher Award by the Texas Music Teachers Association and in 1998, Hilley was awarded the William David Blunk Professorship in recognition of outstanding undergraduate teaching and research. In 2000, she was chosen for membership in Leadership Texas and was elected in September of 2000 to the Leadership Texas Alumni Board of Directors. Hilley was inducted into the Academy of Distinguished Teachers at UT Austin in 2005 and awarded the Distinguished Service Award from the Music Teachers National Association in the spring of 2008. She was named recipient of the University of Texas at Austin Civitatis Award for 2011-2012 and named the 2014 MTNA Teacher of the Year. Ms. Hilley received one of two Life Time Achievement Awards presented at the 2017 National Conference on Keyboard Pedagogy. Martha served as 2019-2021 President of MTNA and assumed the role of Immediate Past President for a two-year term effective March, 2021.

Articles by Professor Hilley have been published in Clavier, Piano Quarterly and Keyboard Companion and within anthologies published by Routledge Press (UK). She is co-author of two college piano texts: "Piano for the Developing Musician " and "Piano for Pleasure." The texts were the first to embrace digital sequencer technology through disks furnished to teachers as well as the first to provide web-based computer tutorials, downloadable pdf and mp3 files and dedicated web sites for each text. Garrison Gerard

Commissioned Composer

GARRISON GERARD (b.1994) is an American composer of electroacoustic and concert music. Characterized by dramatic gestures and moments of arresting luminosity, his music is an exploration through intimate sound worlds. His work builds on multiple traditions spanning from spectralism, modernism, and minimalism as well as reaching back to the classical canon and renaissance music. Growing up in North Georgia, he sang in choir and played violin in orchestra, and the influence of the natural beauty of the area has had a lasting impact on his work.

His music has been presented internationally with performances by groups such as [Mod]ular Ensemble, Fort Worth Symphony, and Nu Atmospheres Ensemble. An ardent collaborator, he has been commissioned by ensembles and soloists such as Andrew Cook, Spencer Byrd, the Avenue C Project, Atelier Piano Quartet, and Amorsima String Trio. In 2020 Gerard served as Artist-in-Residence of Padre Island National Seashore—he recorded sounds



across the island and incorporated them in multiple pieces exploring the biomes and environmental impact of society along the coast of Texas.

Gerard's current interests are turning toward intermedia collaboration and the interaction between nature and music. Recent works have been an exploration in the essence of sounds, they deconstruct constituent timbres and elements before reassembling them in patchworks of interweaving lines. Combining art forms is an area of expanding fascination; he has had the honor to work with multiple artists in the creation of experimental works and performance art pieces—most recently including works with the choreographer Briana Lee exploring the nature of communication and joint improvisation.

In addition to composition, Gerard is a conductor, pianist, trumpeter, improviser, and avid advocate for new music. He is a founding member of the Nu Atmospheres Ensemble and conducts the NOVA New Music Ensemble at the University of North Texas. In 2018 he was the Guest Director for the UNT Percussion Ensemble. A member of the UNT Free Improvisation ensemble, he regularly performs on both trumpet and piano. Working with contemporary composers is a particular focus for him, having conducted the premiere of more than 30 pieces by living composers.

Gerard completed his Masters degree in Music Composition from the University of North Texas and received a Bachelors in Piano from Harding University in Searcy, Arkansas. He is currently a PhD candidate at the University of North Texas in Denton, where he serves as a composition teaching fellow. His composition teachers include Joseph Klein, Sungji Hong, Panayiotis Kokoras, Andrew May, Kirsten Broberg, and Jay Walls.

PERFORMERS



PYEONGKANG PARK, the president of The Korean American Church Musicians Association of Atlanta, has actively performed as the executive director or conductor in various events such as 50th Anniversary of Korean American Association of Greater Atlanta Festival, 100th Anniversary of The March 1st Independence Movement Day Concert, 250th Anniversary of Beethoven's birthday Concert, 2014 Happy New Year's Concert at the Bacolod City Hall, Philippines among many others.

As one of the winners of the 17th International Conducting Workshop and Competition (ICWC) in Georgia 2020, Mr. Park has been selected as a finalist in the college/ university orchestra division of The American Prize in 2021. He has participated in the 23rd Conductors Retreat at Medomak with an unprecedented full scholarship from Kenneth Kiesler 2019 and the 35th LIU Post Chamber Music Festival, awarding the Conducting Award from 2016.

A native Korean, he is contributing to the expansion of music education as the CoFounder and Judge Panel of the Hwaseong-si Music Competition. In addition, he communicates with the public by serving as a radio host in a classical music instruction segment at Atlanta Radio Korea (AM790) since 2017.

Holding BM in Music education from Konkuk University and MM and Artist Certificate in Conducting from Georgia State University, Mr. Park is currently pursuing DMA in Conducting at the University of Georgia with Mark Cedel. His mentors include Michael Palmer, Philip Greenberg, and Kynan Johns.

Pyeongkang Park is music director and conductor of Atlanta Sinfonia and Atlanta Christian Men's Choir.



Since childhood, **EMILY NAZARIO** always had a passion for music. Inspired by her grandfather, a former clarinetist in the United States Marine Band, Emily began learning the flute at age 10.

Ms. Nazario is a freelance flutist and private instructor based in Athens, Georgia, where she is pursuing her Doctorate of Musical Arts degree at the University of Georgia. Emily holds a Master of Music degree in Flute Performance from the University of Wyoming (2018) where she held a Graduate Assistantship, and completed her undergraduate studies from Ithaca College (2015) where she earned a Bachelor of Music Performance. Emily was a member of the University of Wyoming Symphony Orchestra and Wind Symphony, and the Ithaca College Wind Ensemble, with whom she performed at Alice Tully Hall in the spring of 2015. Additionally, Emily spent the Fall 2014 semester of her Bachelor's degree living in The Netherlands, where she studied flute at Conservatorium van Amsterdam.

Emily was awarded first prize at both the Oklahoma Flute Society's Collegiate Competition and the Cedar Luke Young Artist Competition, and was named runner up at the 2017 Wyoming

Symphony Orchestra Young Artist Concerto Competition. She has attended numerous summer festivals and workshops, including the Brevard Music Center, Hot Springs Music Festival, Marrowstone Music Festival and Domaine Forget International Music and Dance Academy.

Dedicated to teaching, Ms. Nazario teaches private flute lessons in Georgia and also through Skype. While living in rural Wyoming, she began teaching flute lessons through platforms such as Skype and has since developed her presentation "The Virtual Flute: 'Skyping' Your Way to a Successful Studio" which she has presented at the Mid-South Flute Society Fair and the Montana Flute Festival. Additionally, Emily has proficient knowledge and skill when it comes to the Baroque flute and plays her own traverso in her spare time.

When she's not playing the flute, Emily can be found hiking in the mountains, cozying up with a good book, traveling in Europe, or simply enjoying coffee with good friends.



AYAKO PEDERSON-TAKEDA (b. 2000) is a composer-cellist-educator based in Athens, GA. She writes music that is colorful and unpredictable, taking the listener on a musical adventure. She is currently pursuing a Bachelor's of Music in Music Education and a Bachelor's of Music in Music Composition at the University of Georgia's Hugh Hodgson School of Music.

Ayako has participated in various UGA ensembles such as the UGA Symphony Orchestra, where she is currently serving as co-principal cellist; the UGA British String Orchestra; the Contemporary Chamber Ensemble; and the Avante Quartet and Embolden, two different mixed ensembles.

Ayako was the HHSOM Large Ensemble Composer-in-Residence for the 2020-2021 academic year and wrote *dear diary...* for the Hodgson Wind Ensemble and Clarke County School District Bands. This piece explores feelings experiencing the COVID-19 pandemic as a music student. She has collaborated

with performers such as Bent Frequency, Ryan Eck (baritone), Bryan Wysocki (percussion), Julien Berger (saxophone), and Caitlin Santos (horn). Ayako is actively involved on campus with organizations such as the UGA String Project, the Student Composers Association Council, and the HHSOM Actionable AntiRacism and Inclusion Committee. She studies composition with Dr. Emily Koh and cello with Dr. David Starkweather. She is a member of CNAfME and Phi Beta Kappa.



Pianist **JIEUN LEE** is in demand as a soloist, chamber musician, an advocate for contemporary music, a teacher, and a trained organist. Ms. Lee gave her solo piano debut at Carnegie Hall in 2017 as a result of a top prize in the American Protégé International Piano and Strings Competition. She was named state winner of the 2015 MTNA Young Artist Piano Competition in Missouri and received top prizes in numerous competitions in her native South Korea, including the Gyeonggi Young Artist, Seoul Christian University, and Seoul Student Music competitions. As a winner of the 2015 Missouri State University Concerto Competition, she performed Prokofiev's Third Piano Concerto with the MSU Symphony Orchestra. Ms. Lee was recently featured on the soundtrack for Netflix's acclaimed documentary, The Social Dilemma. Additional performance highlights include appearances at Drury University, at CU Boulder in a student showcase concert for NASM evaluators, at the 2021 UGA Piano Symposium, and with Jónsi & Alex Somers and the Wordless Music Orchestra in Denver. As a former member of the B.A.D. Contemporary Music Ensemble at CU Boulder, she

premiered numerous new works by the university's students and faculty. Ms. Lee is currently a doctoral candidate at the University of Georgia working with Dr. Liza Stepanova. At UGA, she was awarded a teaching assistantship in class piano and has additionally been entrusted with teaching private lessons to piano minors. A dedicated pedagogue and active participant in the teaching community, she is also a member-at-large of UGA TONIC, the university's MTNA collegiate chapter. Jieun Lee holds two master's degrees, in piano performance and pedagogy, from CU Boulder and two undergraduate degrees, in piano performance and organ, from Missouri State University. At MSU, she received numerous awards and scholarships for her academic achievements, was included on the Dean's List in every semester of her studies, and graduated Magna Cum Laude.



Born in Atlanta, Georgia, **CHRISTOPHER HERNANDEZ** began to harness his talent early on when he taught himself how to play several musical instruments using YouTube tutorials. Determined to follow his ambitions, he made his debut as a composer and conductor directing his high school orchestra by the age of 17. He is currently pursuing a Bachelor's degree in Music Composition at the University of Georgia.

As a violinist, Christopher has performed with several ensembles including the UGA Symphony Orchestra. He has also composed many symphonic pieces such as "Danza Del Ragno", as well as solo works for piano such as "Alight". His side project, under the alias of Casper Diaz, showcases his music production ability, and heavily relies on the power of story to create a sense of empathy within the lyrics of his work. Songs such as "Nice." and "Pure Evil." illustrate a kaleidoscopic venture into how we as humans perceive ourselves.





After having lessons at Villa-Lobos School of Music and the Federal University of Rio de Janeiro, he became Associate Principal Clarinet of Rio de Janeiro Opera Theater Symphony Orchestra at the age of 20. Ricardo held this position until 2019 when he got leave to study in the United States.

Ricardo is currently in the third year of his DMA in Performance under the supervision of Dr D. Ray McClellan at the University of Georgia. He is a Teacher Assistant at the UGA clarinet studio, where he teaches one-on-one lessons and coaches clarinet ensembles. Besides the academic activities, Ricardo also works as a clarinet faculty at UGA Community Music School.

THURSDAY NIGHT PERFORMERS



With a performance career spanning forty-five years, **JAMES F. MELLICHAMP** has made prominent appearances as an organist throughout the United States, Canada, Europe, and Asia. His concerts have included solo recitals at such notable venues as the Washington Cathedral, Berlin Cathedral, Dijon Cathedral, Cathedral of Notre Dame in Paris, Moscow Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception, St. Paul's Cathedral and Westminster Abbey in London.

As an organ consultant, he has been responsible for the design of over fifty organs for churches and colleges in the United States.

Since 1982 Dr. Mellichamp has been a faculty member at Piedmont University, a comprehensive regional institution in Georgia, where, as Professor of Music, he maintains an active studio of young organists. After years of service as Dean of the College, and later Vice President-Provost, he was elected University President in 2012.

He received a Baccalaureate degree in organ performance from Huntingdon College in Alabama; a Diploma from the Hochschule für Musik in Herford, Germany; and the Doctor of Music degree from Indiana University. In 2015 he was named Distinguished Organ Alumnus by the Jacobs School of Music at Indiana University.











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TOBIAS LIU is a seventeen-year-old violinist who is a student of Nadir Khashimov and a previous student of Sonja Foster and Keiko Furness. Tobias made his solo debut at age eleven with the Georgia Philharmonic as the first prize winner of the Samuel Fordis Young Artists Concerto Competition. In addition to winning the Georgia Music Teachers Association Instrumental Concerto Competition, he is also a winner of the concerto competitions of the Alpharetta Symphony Orchestra, DeKalb Symphony Orchestra and Augusta Symphony Orchestra and has received the special achievement award from the Philadelphia International Music Festival at the Hilton Head Symphony Youth Concerto Competition. At age ten, he performed at Weill Hall at Carnegie Hall as a first prize winner of the American Protégé International Competition.



Tobias has served as concertmaster of the Atlanta Symphony Youth Orchestra and the GMEA All-State Orchestra. His piano trio won the Grand Prize in the Franklin Pond Chamber Music Competition, after which their performance at Spivey Hall was broadcasted on WABE Radio. Tobias was invited to perform Osvaldo Golijov's Nonet, "Last Round," with the principal players of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra. Through his participations in the Bowdoin International Music Festival, the Orford International Music Festival, he has worked with distinguished artists such as Cho-Liang Lin, Robin Scott, Nelson Lee, Renee Jolles, Kurt Sassmannshaus, Mark Kaplan, Ani Schnarch, Karen Gomyo and Steven Copes.

Tobias is a senior at the Westminster Schools where he was presented the Funk Memorial Award for "the Most Contribution to All Phases of Student Life" and where he serves as the Music Service Club President, Investment Club President, Bi-Line Newspaper Editor, and Georgia State Champion Varsity Swim Team Captain. In addition, Tobias has studied abroad in Spain and Argentina.



JUI-WEN GINGER CHEN received her Doctor of Music degree in Piano Performance and Master of Music degree in Piano Performance and Pedagogy from Northwestern University where she was a piano instructor, a chamber music coach and a choral/opera accompanist. She also received a Certificate of Piano Performance and Pedagogy from the Piano Institute at Saint-Petersburg Conservatory, Russia. Ginger has studied piano with Raymond Dudley, David Kaiserman, Elena Shishko, Jean Barr, Claude Frank, Richard Goode and Menahem Pressler.

Dr. Chen has performed extensively in Taiwan and the United States, performed for the broadcast on WNIB Radio in Chicago, soloed with the Columbia Philharmonic Orchestra, the Northwestern University Orchestra and the DeKalb

Symphony Orchestra and, she has shared the stage with renowned artists such as Itzhak Perlman, Glenn Dicterow, and David Kim. Ginger is a winner of many awards, including the Vemo-Ross-Orndorff International Music Award Competition, the Grace Welsh Prize for Piano in Chicago, the Taiwan Youth Piano Solo Competition, the Taiwan Youth Chamber Music Competition (as a violinist), and the Golden Lion Prize for Taiwan's Most Distinguished Young Musicians.
