

88 Keys, 30 Fingers: A Pedagogical Approach to Four- and Six-Hand Playing

This presentation will explore the pedagogy of four- and six-hand piano music for intermediate students through a discussion of rehearsal strategies, technical demands, interpretive possibilities, and collaborative considerations. Performance excerpts will include demonstrations from the earliest known keyboard duets by composer Thomas Tomkins in the 17th century, to six-hand piano music by Sergei Rachmaninov in the 20th century.

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Exams and assessments in our graded exam system and diploma program are offered for all instruments, including singing. Over 650,000 students in 93 countries test themselves every year against our internationally recognized standards. There are currently 22 exam centers in the U.S. for in-person "Practical Grade Exam" with ABRSM examiners from the UK. The ABRSM Georgia Exam Center was established in 1996.

The NEW addition of the "Performance Grade Exam" with video submission has become very popular since its launch in January 2021, as well as the online music theory exam which started in May 2021.



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Paul Barnes

Conference Recitalist

Praised by the New York Times for his "Lisztian thunder and deft fluidity," and the San Francisco Chronicle as "ferociously virtuosic," pianist **PAUL BARNES** has electrified audiences with his intensely expressive playing and cutting-edge programming. He has been featured seven times on APM's *Performance Today* and on the cover of Clavier Magazine with his recordings streamed worldwide.

Celebrating his twenty-five-year collaboration with Philip Glass, Barnes commissioned and gave the world premiere of Glass's *Piano Quintet "Annunciation."* The work is Glass's first piano quintet and first work based on Greek Orthodox chant. Barnes' recording of the quintet with string quartet superstars Brooklyn Rider was released in October of 2019 to critical acclaim. *ResMusica* in Paris wrote: "Paul Barnes, whose pianistic lines are always clear, is a marvel of dialogue with Brooklyn Rider."

Barnes' twelfth CD <u>New Generations: The New Etudes of Philip Glass and Music of the Next Generation</u> has also received rave reviews. Gramophone Magazine wrote, "Pianists of Barnes's great technique and musicality are a



boon to new music." And American Record Guide commented, "This disc provides further proof of Barnes's ability to communicate new music with flair and passion." Produced by Orange Mountain Music, the recording features the world-premiere recording of *Dreaming Awake*, a selection of Glass's etudes and works by N. Lincoln Hanks, Lucas Floyd, Jason Bahr, Zack Stanton, Ivan Moody, and Jonah Gallagher.

Barnes is Marguerite Scribante Professor of Music at the <u>University of Nebraska-Lincoln Glenn Korff School of Music</u>. He was recently appointed Artistic Director of the <u>Lied Center Piano Academy</u> which welcomes several high-school pianists to Lincoln each summer for an intensive week of piano, composition, improvisation and collaboration. He will also be teaching this summer in Greece at the <u>Piano Plus Summer Institute</u>. In great demand as a pedagogue and clinician, Barnes has served as convention artist at several state MTNA conventions, most recently at Virginia and was named 'Teacher of the Year" by the Nebraska Music Teachers Association.

Barnes latest recital *Illumination* features a contemplative and cathartic program of piano works inspired by the mystical world of chant. Barnes, also a Greek Orthodox chanter, has collaborated most recently with Philip Glass and Victoria Bond to create piano works based on ancient byzantine and Jewish chant. New chant-based works by Native American flutist Ron Warren and David von Kampen are also given their premiere performances. Barnes gave the world premiere of Victoria Bond's *Illuminations on Byzantine Chant* at New York's Symphony Space in April of 2021. Barnes released his fourteenth recording this fall on Albany Records entitled *Illumination: The Piano Works of Victoria Bond* including the world-premiere recording of *Illuminations on Byzantine Chant*. American Record Guide wrote "he sings with haunting musicality...and plays with fervid virtuosity...the music is calm and meditative, perfect for these troubled times."

Barnes has commissioned Native American flutist and composer Ron Warren to write a large scales piano work to be premiered at a special celebration of Ron's music on September 26th, 2022 in Lincoln. The work entitled "The Way of Mountains and Desert" explores Native themes of creation and beauty.

WYNN-ANNE ROSSI is an acclaimed American composer with vibrant educational outreach. She has a respect for all genres of music, and her diversity of experience and love of discovery reflect in her expressions as a pianist, composer and presenter. She has over 150 piano publications which are widely distributed online and in music stores. Her repertoire also includes works for vocal and chamber groups, concert band and orchestra. Commissions include works sponsored by Minnesota Public Radio, the National Endowment for the Arts, and the American Composers Forum.

Wynn-Anne has a strong commitment to musical education. She has been offering composition residencies since 2003, inspiring thousands of students to create their own music. Partnerships have included the MUNDI Project (UT), Linda Luebke String Festival (IN) and the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra (MN). Her innovative video series, Wednesdays with Wynn-Anne, offers two seasons on creative self-expression and jazz history/improvisation. BRANDON K. SMITH (b. 1994) is a composer and arranger based in Atlanta, Georgia. In November 2021, he was selected as the 2022 commissioned composer for the Georgia Music Teachers Association, where he will present a suite for flute and harp at the association's annual conference. In November 2019, he was commissioned to write a choral/orchestral composition for Coro Vocati, a professional choir based in Atlanta. The piece "Starry Night" was premiered February 2020 and was also featured on NPR "City Lights". In April 2020, he received first place in the musical composition category of the Georgia State Undergraduate Research Conference, for a



composition dedicated to mathematical techniques in traditional flamenco music. He has also received commissions from acclaimed ensembles Memoduo and Libertalia Philharmonic. He received his master's and bachelor's degrees at the Georgia State University School of Music.

Brandon is also an avid performer, teacher, and director in the Atlanta area. In 2019 he founded Leading Tone, Georgia State's first chamber choir and he currently serves as the group's artistic director and primary vocal arranger. Performing credits include concerts with acclaimed composers Eric Whitacre and Caroline Shaw, and acclaimed ensembles Georgia State University Singers and the University of Pittsburgh Men's Glee Club. Teaching credits include piano and voice lessons with Play More Music in Atlanta and Bach to Rock Music School in Alpharetta. He currently serves as the tenor section leader at St. Paul's Episcopal Church and on the advisory board of the Peach State Opera. He has also written articles that have been featured in the periodical The Collective. Upcoming projects include A Late Bloom-an album of original art songs, and an original chamber opera.


