Welcome to Shorter University! The School of Fine and Performing Arts is so excited to be hosting this year's GMTA annual conference. Our students, faculty, staff, and administration are eager to take advantage of all the opportunities this meeting provides: learning from lectures and exhibits, improving our practice routines and performances through masterclasses, and even just enjoying wonderful music in the concerts, all within the span of a few days shared together.

Shorter's School of Fine and Performing Arts has a legacy of excellence in the arts, and we are honored to carry that legacy forward, educating future generations of performers, music educators, artists, and academics. Students come to our programs from all over the world to study in these areas from a distinctly Christian perspective. While we may be one of the smaller schools in GMTA's membership, our programs are central to Shorter University's identity. Our students choose from eight degree options, BA-Music, BA-Theatre, BFA-Musical Theatre, BFA-Theatre, BM-Music Education, BM-Piano, BM-Piano Pedagogy, and BM-Voice. We stage six productions per year between our Theatre, Musical Theatre, and Opera programs, and we feature numerous performances from guest artists, ensembles, faculty, and students. There's almost always music happening on our hill!

Of note for GMTA, this academic year Shorter is celebrating the completion of our Piano Program Project. Under the leadership of Dr. Jerico Vasquez, the Chair of our Music Department and Keyboard Area Coordinator, and Prof. Amy Neal, Assistant Professor of Piano Pedagogy, we have raised over \$60,000 towards improvements of our keyboard instruments. We've updated our practice rooms, conducted critical maintenance on the Shigeru Kawai concert grand that you'll hear in Brookes Chapel, and we are in the process of a full rebuild of the Steinway concert grand that is *usually* also on our chapel stage. (You'll have to come back in the Spring semester to enjoy that "new" instrument!) These fundraising efforts speak both to Shorter's tradition of excellence in keyboard performance and pedagogy, and to our continued commitment to the arts in the twenty-first century.

Now, more than ever, the arts and humanities are central to understanding the crises of our modern era. If we are to find solutions to the problems facing humanity, we must understand what it means to be human. To create. To feel. 
May this conference be a wonderful time of community, music, and learning for all of us. Make yourselves at home and thank you for being here!

The fermata is an important musical symbol, yet students often ignore it. #### Transposition Through Reading and Ear Development

Students generally spend little time working on transposition skills. Time is devoted mostly to learning repertoire excluding other important aspects of musicianship. Therefore, many students achieve high levels of technique without acquiring basic skills that would support their repertoire even more. Transposition, reading and ear development were integral to learning and pre-requisites to becoming an accomplished musician in the 19th century and before. These skills can easily be incorporated into today's typical piano lesson content.





#### SIMONE DINNERSTEIN

#### **Conference Recitalist**

**SIMONE DINNERSTEIN** is an American pianist. She lives in Brooklyn, New York with her husband and dog, less than a mile from the hospital in which she was born.

Simone has a distinctive musical voice. The Washington Post has called her "an artist of strikingly original ideas and irrefutable integrity." She first came to wider public attention in 2007 through her recording of Bach's Goldberg Variations, reflecting an aesthetic that was both deeply rooted in the score and profoundly idiosyncratic. She is, wrote The New York Times, "a unique voice in the forest of Bach interpretation."

Since that recording, she has had a busy performing career. She has played with orchestras ranging from the New York Philharmonic and the Montreal Symphony Orchestra to the London Symphony Orchestra and the Orchestra Sinfonica Nazionale Rai. She has performed in venues from Carnegie Hall and the Kennedy Center to the Berlin Philharmonie, the Vienna Konzerthaus, the Seoul Arts Center and the Sydney Opera House. She has made thirteen albums, all of which topped the Billboard classical charts, with repertoire ranging from Couperin to Glass.

This season, Simone takes on a number of new artistic challenges. She gives the world premiere of The Eye Is the First Circle at Montclair State University, the first multi-media production she has conceived, created, and directed, which uses as source materials her father Simon Dinnerstein's painting The Fulbright Triptych and Charles Ives's Piano Sonata



No. 2 (Concord). In addition, she premieres Richard Danielpour's An American Mosaic, a tribute to those affected by the pandemic, in a performance on multiple pianos placed throughout Brooklyn's Green-Wood Cemetery. She also joins Renée Fleming, the Emerson String Quartet, and Uma Thurman for performances of André Previn and Tom Stoppard's Penelope at both Carnegie Hall and the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C.

From 2020 to 2022, Simone releases a trilogy of albums recorded at her home in Brooklyn during the pandemic. A Character of Quiet (Orange Mountain Music, 2020), featuring the music of Philip Glass and Schubert, was described by NPR as, "music that speaks to a sense of the world slowing down," and by The New Yorker as, "a reminder that quiet can contain multitudes." Richard Danielpour's An American Mosaic (Supertrain Records, 2021), surpassed two million streams on Apple Music and was nominated for a 2021 Grammy Award in the category of Best Classical Instrumental Solo. The final installment in the trilogy, Undersong, was released in January 2022 on Orange Mountain Music.

In recent years, Simone has created projects that express her broad musical interests. Following her recording of Mozart in Havana, she brought the Havana Lyceum Orchestra from Cuba to the United States for the very first time, raising the funding, booking the concerts, and organizing their housing and transport. Together, Simone and the orchestra played eleven concerts from Miami to Boston. Philip Glass composed his Piano Concerto No. 3 for Simone, co-commissioned by twelve American and Canadian orchestras. She collaborated with choreographer Pam Tanowitz to create New Work for Goldberg Variations, which was met with widespread critical acclaim. Working with Renée Fleming and the Emerson String Quartet, she premiered André Previn and Tom Stoppard's Penelope at the Tanglewood, Ravinia and Aspen music festivals. Most recently, she created her own string ensemble, Baroklyn, which she directs from the keyboard. Their performance of Bach's cantata Ich Habe Genug in March 2020 was the last concert she gave before New York City shut down.

Simone is committed to giving concerts in non-traditional venues and to audiences who don't often hear classical music. For the last three decades, she has played concerts throughout the United States for the Piatigorsky Foundation, an organization dedicated to the widespread dissemination of classical music. It was for the Piatigorsky Foundation that she gave the first piano recital in the Louisiana state prison system at the Avoyelles Correctional Center. She has also performed at the Maryland Correctional Institution for Women in a concert organized by the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra. Simone founded Neighborhood Classics in 2009, a concert series open to the public and hosted by New York City Public Schools to raise funds for their music education programs. She also created a program called Bachpacking during which she takes a digital keyboard to elementary school classrooms, helping young children get close to the music she loves. She is a committed supporter and proud alumna of Philadelphia's Astral Artists, which supports young performers.

Simone counts herself fortunate to have studied with three unique artists: Solomon Mikowsky, Maria Curcio and Peter Serkin, very different musicians who shared the belief that playing the piano is a means to something greater. The Washington Post comments that "ultimately, it is Dinnerstein's unreserved identification with every note she plays that makes her performance so spellbinding." In a world where music is everywhere, she hopes that it can still be transformative.

#### **NOA KAGEYAMA**

#### **Pedagogy Headliner**

Born in Marysville, Ohio, performance psychologist **DR. NOA KAGEYAMA** is on the faculty at Juilliard and is the performance psychology coach for the New World Symphony. Kageyama has degrees from Oberlin (BA, psychology) and Juilliard (MM, violin performance) and studied with Stephen Clapp, Ronald Copes, Franco Gulli, Paul Kantor, Masao Kawasaki, Roland and Almita Vamos, and Donald Weilerstein before making the leap to psychology. He received his MS and PhD in counseling and counseling psychology from Indiana University. Kageyama specializes in teaching performing artists how to utilize sports psychology principles to more consistently



demonstrate their full abilities under pressure. He has conducted workshops at institutions workshops at institutions including Northwestern University, New England Conservatory, Peabody, Eastman, and the U.S. Armed Forces School of Music. He has taught at programs such as the Starling-DeLay Symposium, the Perlman Music Program, and the National Orchestral Institute, and for organizations like the Music Teachers' National Association and the National Association of Teachers of Singing.

Kageyama has been featured in The Wall Street Journal, Musical America, Strings Magazine, Strad, and Lifehacker. He maintains a private coaching practice and writes a performance psychology blog, The Bulletproof Musician, which has more than 100,000 monthly readers.



#### **BRANDON WALKER**

#### **Commissioned Composer**

"Stages, A Student's Journey" is a suite for soprano saxophone and string trio, composed of four movements. The use of the number four is common in educational frameworks, such as the four learning types, four high school grades, and four levels of competence. This piece depicts four stages of a student's musical journey, with each movement representing a different stage of learning.

The first movement - "The Discovery" - portrays the initial excitement and inspiration to learn music. The second movement - "The Exploration" - describes the growing curiosity and challenges of learning to play music. The third movement - "The Mastery" - is more complex and represents the student's increasing musical skill and proficiency. The fourth movement - "The Celebration" - is a triumphant and joyful piece that represents the student's achievement of their musical goals. Here, the soprano saxophone embodies "the student," while the string trio (violin, viola, and cello) supports, challenges, and engages this voice.

The composition takes inspiration from the impressionistic modal works of Maurice Ravel, Claude Debussy, and Nadia Boulanger, combined with harmonic elements of jazz. The piece has a duration of approximately seven minutes."

BRANDON WALKER is a versatile, award-winning composer and musician whose music takes you on a visual journey. His classical and cinematic compositions have premiered with orchestras across North America, including the Reno Pops, Brazosport, Scarborough, and Brantford Symphony Orchestras.

Brandon's passion is crafting music and engaging listeners by utilizing the many vivid colors of the modern-day symphonic orchestra. His background in jazz and classical composition, as well as his experience with film and music audio production,



are significant influences. He performs solo piano regularly in the Savannah, Georgia, area. In addition, he has played saxophone for the Hilton Head Symphony Orchestra, the Fabulous Equinox Orchestra, the Jazz Connection Big Band, Bohemian Swing, and many other groups at venues and festivals.

In 2020, Brandon won "Producer of the Year" at The Niagara Music Awards, recognizing his work with The Jimmy Stahl Big Band. Other career highlights include eight Golden Reel Award Nominations and winning a Gemini and two Directors Guild of Canada Awards. Additionally, as a writer and a publisher with ASCAP, his compositions have been played on National Public Radio, KUSC, JazzFM, WUCF, and many other radio stations across North America. Brandon enjoys spending time with his family and enjoying the culture, waterfront scenes, and history of the Savannah, Georgia, area.

#### COMMISSIONED COMPOSER PERFORMERS

**BENJAMIN CORK** is a violinist originally from Atlanta, Georgia, and an alumnus of Georgia Southern University, having studied violin performance. Having begun playing the violin at 11 years old, he instantly fell in love with the instrument. During his tenure, Ben was the concertmaster of the Georgia Southern Symphony and the first violinist of the Honors Magnolia String Quartet. He also had the honor of winning the University Concerto Competition in 2017 and performed the virtuosic first movement of the Tchaikovsky violin concerto later that year. Throughout his early career so far, he has also been performing various events around Southeast Georgia, as well as the South Carolina and Florida areas; these include numerous weddings, church services, operas, musicals, cantatas, house



events, etc. When he is not performing, he teaches the art of playing the violin to students of all ages in Brunswick and Savannah, Georgia. Recently, Ben has been performing with the well-known Savannah Philharmonic and has joined both Augusta Symphony and Alpharetta Symphony; he holds the Principal Second Violin position with the Alpharetta Symphony.



AMANDA ZHANG graduated with a BM in Viola Performance from the Fred and Dinah Gretsch School of Music. She also studied at the Manhattan School of Music before completing a dual degree in music and a BS in Biology at Georgia Southern University. Originally from Savannah, GA, she began playing viola at 11. She has also attended festivals such as the Boston University Tanglewood Institute for String Quartet and Orchestra, the Castleman Quartet Program, the Green Mountain Chamber Music Festival, and the Governor's Honors Program. Amanda has studied under Larisa Elisha, Patinka Kopec, Lizhou Liu, Daniel Sweaney, the Muir String Quartet, and Wolfram Koessel from the American String Quartet. In addition, she has received masterclasses

from Michael Zaretsky of the Boston Symphony Orchestra, Jan Grüning of the Ariel String Quartet, Norman Fischer, and Paul Watkins from the Emerson String Quartet.

**FAHYA POLITE** is from Savannah, Georgia. She is a junior at Kennesaw State University, and is a music education major. She hopes to be a strings teacher in the future and has been playing cello since she was 10. Last December, she was blessed with the opportunity to play along with the Savannah Philharmonic for Andrea Bocelli. Music is her passion, and she hopes to share her love of music with her students in the future.

DAHYUN KATIE YANG, a 15-year-old, began her piano journey at the age of 5 in San Jose, CA. At just 6 years old, she achieved 1st place in her debut competition. 


