

In March, we enjoyed our March Masterclass with Dr. Joe Chapman, who put the students at ease and gave helpful comments. Several of our members also enjoyed participating in the MTNA conference in Atlanta. On May 15, we celebrated the end of the year with our luncheon and presented our Teacher of the Year award to our very deserving Pam Asberry, who inspires all of us.

Our student events included our Music Day festival in November, Performance Day in December, local auditions and three federated festivals in February and March, and our Jr./Sr. Scholarship in April. We had 102 students registered for local auditions this year, which was a large increase from previous years. We were blessed to be able to award several scholarships to our students, including our MED/PED scholarship for high school seniors who are planning to study music education or pedagogy. While we do not receive applicants every year, this year we were happy to award this \$500 scholarship to a deserving student and future music educator.

LOCAL ASSOCIATION HIGHLIGHT—MIDDLE GEORGIA MTA

CHENNY GAN, PRESIDENT

Throughout the past year, we have tried to utilize various resources outside of local meetings to facilitate experiential learning opportunities and promote fellowship. For example, we organized a carpool for the UGA Piano Pedagogy Symposium in January, which allowed members to chat and get to know each other over the day, in addition to experiencing the excellent content of the conference.

Our biannual signature event "A Grand Ensemble!" was successfully held on November 11th at Wesleyan College's Porter Auditorium. Four grand pianos were moved to the auditorium stage and up to 8 pianists at a time performed piano duets, trios and quartets together. Eighteen pieces were featured, and around 100 student and teacher performers participated in this "monster" piano recital, with students ranging from elementary to college age. The concert also featured a tribute to the United States Armed Forces to celebrate Veterans Day. An event of this scale, which became a successful fundraiser for us this year, took massive organization and volunteer hours from numerous teachers, parents and students.

Our 2024 NFMC Festival was held in March. The Macon Festival Senior Club (chaired by Denise West) held 8 events, including piano solo, hymns, piano concerto, vocal musical theater, vocal art song, violin and theory. We had 111 participants (including 1 adult) from 12 teachers, resulting in 93 superior ratings. It was a huge event and very successful from all accounts. Participants also included a dedicated group of teen runners, parent volunteers, and excellent judges (Karen Fulwood, Keaton Byrd, Owen Lovell, Maryann Thames, Wendy Shaw and our virtual judge Judith Barton). Our Theory test proctor was Ivy Giddens.

On Marcy 19th, our chapter was honored at the MTNA National Conference in Atlanta to receive the "Local Association of the Year" award. Several teachers and students carpooled from Macon to witness the announcement. Sunday that week, Susan Mincey and Chenny Gan used the funds saved on hotel costs reimbursed by MTNA to hold a celebration and reception in Macon for all teachers to attend. We could not be more proud of the collective work over many decades that has made this honor a reality!

In May, local member Charlotte Bearden organized a day-long improvisation workshop with 9 participants that was open to teachers, their private high school students, and collegiate members within our organization. The activity took place at Wesleyan College's Piano Lab and was led by Dr. Chenny Gan. The diversity in backgrounds and experiences of the participants really strengthened the workshop's purpose of addressing the topic of improvisation from many viewpoints: for teaching, in church and hymn-playing, in classical performance, in popular genres, and for building self-confidence. Committing an entire day also helped everyone have time to learn, try out, and absorb a lot of new information in an effective way.

MIAO FEN LIN, PRESIDENT

North Dekalb Music Teachers Association had our kickoff meeting for the 2023-2024 year in August at Piano Works. In September, we joined the Atlanta and North Fulton chapters at Catherine Rollin's Workshop and Masterclass. In October, Pam Asberry was our guest speaker. She shared about the unique challenges and opportunities of teaching transfer students. We also hosted our Sonatina/Sonata Competition at GSU in October. In November, Dr. Chenny Gan from Wesleyan College presented the topic "Spice it Up! Incorporating Improvisation into the Classical Repertiore." In December, we enjoyed a luncheon together instead of a meeting.

In January, Dr. Hsien-Ann Meng from Howard Community College presented her topic "Look Ahead and Be Ready: Rethinking Sight Reading in Lessons." We also hosted our Ensemble Olympics at Piano Works. In February, we enjoyed Dr. Alan Woo's Masterclass at Piano Works and hosted our GMTA Local Auditions at GSU. In March, some of our members were able to attend the MTNA Conference in Atlanta. In April, our teachers presented a "Teachers and Friends Spring Concert" at Piano Works. We finished the year in May with our annual luncheon.

DONATE TO GMTA


The **GMTA** General Award Fund, established in 1993, includes honorary and memorial gifts and is awarded at the discretion of the GMTA Finance Advisory Committee. Awards from this fund are given to senior string, vocal, and brass/woodwind winners of GMTA auditions and MTNA Competitions. Donations not designated for a specific fund go into this fund. This past year, GMTA received donations from Cherokee MTA as well as the many members who bought raffle tickets at the GMTA Conference. Awards were given totaling \$700 this year.

The Nolting Award in Composition was established in 1987 and initially funded by beloved GMTA member Betty Nolting. It is given at the GMTA Conference each year to first-place winners in the MTNA Student Composition Competitions for the state-level competitions in each age category: elementary, junior, senior, and young artist. Each student receives \$100. Awards were given totaling \$300 this year.

The **Broadhurst Award in Piano** was established in 1992 in commemoration of Joan Broadhurst by her family. This award is presented annually at the GMTA conference to the winners of the MTNA Junior and Senior Piano Performance Competition. Each student receives \$200. **Awards were given totaling \$400 this year**.

The **Betty H. White Award Fund** was established in 2019 in commemoration of Betty H. White by her family. This \$400 award is presented annually at the GMTA Conference to one of the GMTA Teacher Grant recipients for a student in financial need. This year GMTA received a donation to the Betty H. White Award Fund from Mary Barnes. **The award of \$400 was given this year.**

GMTA supports **MTNA Foundation** through donations that are received from the raffle of the hydraulic bench at the state conference. This year we also raised funds to name two Foundation Fellows. Joey Hokayem and David Watkins were honored as MTNA Foundation Fellows during the Gala at the National Conference. Congratulations to both gentlemen!



DIANE BOYD, NCTM, GMTA THEORY CHAIR

THE NEW GMTA THEORY CURRICULUM IS COMING!

The GMTA Theory Committee has been hard at work developing a new Theory curriculum that will debut this fall. I will highlight the changes here.

The GMTA Theory test will now have 12 levels. The first three levels are designed for younger students and will not require handwriting. Students will answer questions by circling or drawing lines to answers. Questions may be True or False or multiple choice. After these levels, the format of the GMTA tests will be similar to the current tests. They will include ear-training, but the eartraining will be limited to no more than 10 points per test. Each level gradually adds material to what has been presented in earlier levels.

Levels do not have to be taken consecutively and levels do not necessarily correspond to grades. Teachers will be able to enter their students on any level in any year. A student may repeat a level or move to an earlier level if the teacher feels they are not ready to go to a later level. Students may take two tests in one school year by taking one in the fall and one in the spring. As before, students will be able to exempt GATE tests by passing certain levels of the GMTA tests. Tests taken in the fall will be graded and the exemption list updated in January.

The GATE test is the required test that students take to participate in Auditions. There are now 4 **levels** of the GATE test:

Fourth and **Fifth grade** students must pass or exempt the GATE Level **A** test. **Sixth** and **Seventh grade** students must pass or exempt the GATE Level **B** test. **Eighth** and **Ninth grade** students must pass or exempt the GATE Level C test. **Tenth**, **Eleventh** and **Twelfth grade** students must pass or exempt the GATE Level **D** test.

It is important to note that the GATE test may only be taken once in a school year. If a student takes and fails to pass the GATE test in the fall, they will not be able to retake it in the spring. If the student takes the GMTA test in the fall and fails to make a high enough grade to exempt the GATE, they may take the GATE test before Auditions in the spring. continued on next page

THEORY REPORT, CONTINUED

DIANE BOYD, NCTM, GMTA THEORY CHAIR

Current exemptions will be honored. For example, a ninth grade student with a current Level C exemption is ready to participate in Auditions in the Spring of 2025. There are currently no exemptions for Level D so <u>ALL</u> 10th, 11th and 12th grade students <u>must</u> either exempt Level D by passing Level 10 of the GMTA test in the fall of 2024 or pass the GATE Level D test in the fall of 2024 or spring of 2025.

GATE A is exempted by passing the GMTA Theory Level 5 with a grade of 90 or above. GATE B is exempted by passing GMTA Theory Level 7 with a grade of 85 or above. GATE C is exempted by passing GMTA Theory Level 9 with a grade of 85 or above. GATE D is exempted by passing GMTA Theory Level 10 with a grade of 80 or above.

The curriculum of the GMTA tests and the GATE tests are now aligned. Each level of the tests includes the same categories. These include: Accidentals, Articulation, Cadences, Chords, Circle of Fifths, Dynamics, Form, Intervals, Keyboard, Key Signatures, Note-Naming, Note/Rest Values, Ornamentation, Rhythm, Scales/Modes, Staff, Tempo, Time Signatures and Transposition. New test material is added in subsequent levels for each category, building on previous levels. In addition to the curriculum requirements, each level of the GMTA tests includes vocabulary with definitions and a cumulative vocabulary.

The new curriculum will be uploaded to the GMTA website in July. In addition to the individual GMTA levels (1-12), there will be a "Category List" and an "Outline". The Category List will show the progression of concepts. The Outline will provide a quick look at what is new for each level.

This past April, Renee Fleming, along with Dr Sanjay Gupta and a panel of Emory researchers, presented Music + Mind at the Woodruff Performing Arts Center. This informative event explored the subject of the brain's complexity through Music. The program coincided with the release of a book edited by Renée Fleming called *Music and Mind: Harnessing the Arts for Health and Wellness*. The hardback recently became available on Amazon as well as Kindle and Audible Audiobooks. I was privileged to attend the book signing following her ASO concert of Strauss songs and highly recommend reading this book.



The National Endowment for the Arts and the National Institute of Health held a 2-day joint meeting at the Kennedy Center for the Arts this past December. Fortunately I was able to attend virtually. The purpose of the meeting was to compare scientific research findings and share information from the last 6 years about music and health. Sessions included research on the science of music, music therapy and music medicine, music education and health, future directions, networks and capacity building of an integrative health research community, and integration of music-based interventions into health care systems. Over 35 million dollars have been awarded in grants to many projects that explore the healing power of music. Keynote speakers were the renowned singer Renée Fleming and Dr. Francis Collins, MD, National Human Genome Research Institute and Former National Institute of Health (NIH) Director.

Things we as musicians know intuitively are now being scientifically proven and are being (or will be) prescribed as treatment. Some scientific findings include that listening to relaxing music before surgery was found as effective as diazepam (Valium) in reducing stress and anxiety. One power point stated, "Music, more so than speech, engages emotional centers mediating reward and arousal, the same networks associated with eating chocolate, taking opium, and having sex." Treatment of Parkinson's disease and many other medical conditions with music therapy has also been proven successful. For full recordings of the meetings follow these links:
