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
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GMTA TEACHER OF THE YEAR 2024

VICENTE DELLA TONIA JR.

Dr. Vicente Della Tonia Jr., our Georgia MTA 2024 Teacher of the Year, received his Doctor of Musical Arts degree in Piano from the University of South Carolina, where he studied under Marina Lomazov and Scott Price. Prior to this, he studied with Judit Gabos, Sergio Gallo, and Rosa Maria Tolon Marin, and received the Master of Music in Piano Performance (Georgia State University), Bachelor of Music in Piano Performance (Universidade do Sagrado Coracao, Brazil) and Artist Diploma/Certificate (Conservatorio Musical de Lencois Paulista, Brazil).

Currently, Vicente is Coordinator of Keyboard Studies and Associate Professor of Piano at Georgia State University/Perimeter at Clarkston, where he is the founder and director of the Perimeter PianoFest, the Distinguished Guest Artist Masterclass Series, and the Young Artists Recital Series. Prior to GSU, he was a faculty mem-

ber at Allen University and University of South Carolina Music School in Columbia, SC; Claflin University in Orangeburg, SC; and Seminario Santo Antonio and Consevatorio Musical de Lencois Paulista, both in Brazil.

Vicente has taught students who have won competitions locally, nationally, and internationally, and many have continued in music and teach in various institutions. He has given lectures and





recitals in many local programs and state conferences including Georgia, Colorado, Illinois, Minnesota, South Carolina, Texas, and Washington and has also presented at MTNA Conferences.

"Vicente has always been an absolute joy to work with and a true inspiration. He brings out the best in everyone."








Plans are in the making for our 2025 Conference. Everything was lined up with Valdosta State

2024 CONFERENCE REPORT

The 2024 GMTA conference was held from Nov. 7-9 on the vibrant campus of Georgia State University-Perimeter College in Clarkston, GA. Many thanks to GSU-Perimeter College, especially to professors Dr. Brian Bonin and Dr. Vicente Della Tonia, Jr., who not only helped to prepare for the event, but who, along with their students and colleagues, were also on hand to assist during the event. Thank you, also, to members of the Atlanta, Decatur, and Gwinnett MTA's for the wonderful hospitality they provided throughout the conference.

It was a full and inspiring few days for the 100+ attendees (which included almost 50 collegiate students)! Throughout the course of the conference, 16 general sessions were offered by GMTA members and non-members, including five sessions that involved collegiate members. Session topics ranged from studio management tips to pedagogical approaches and ideas to repertoire and composer explorations.

Our Pedagogy Headliner, pianist, composer, and pedagogue, Dr. Victor Labenske, kicked off the first of his three sessions

with "Performance Practice in Contemporary Stylings: Strategies for Playing Celtic, Jazz, Gospel, Pop and Latin Music with Confidence" that guided us through essential characteristics of popular styles. The second session, "Hidden Motives: Quotes, Symbols, and Other Compositional Techniques Found in the Works of Pedagogical Composers," explored methods of quotation, pictorial writing, cultural references and soggetto cavato found within pedagogical compositions. Dr. Labenske's final session on Friday morning showcased his own compositions, providing us with an opportunity to gain familiarity with the wide variety of styles and levels of his compositional output.

Dr. Labenske's sessions thoroughly engaging, were entertaining, and enlightening.

On Friday afternoon, following the GMTA business meeting, we were treated to the premiere performance of a mixed media work by GMTA's 2024 Commissioned Composer, James A. Devor. His work, dear delightful hollow square for bass clarinet (James Devor) and clarinet (Paige Amramson), had the audience situated inside the middle of a "hollow square" with the four encircling speakers passing off live modulation of prerecorded vocals, spoken text, and instrumental textures. Inspired by traditional shape-note or Sacred Harp singing,

dear delightful hollow square got its title from the physical set-up of the four vocal parts: trebles, altos, tenors, and basses. Audience members also had the opportunity to view shape note manuscript and participate in a question-and-answer session with the composer.

Our Conference Recitalist and Masterclass Clinician, Michelle Cann, captivated us on Friday evening with her performance of Frédéric Chopin's Ballade No. 3, Three American Preludes by Joel Thompson, Alberto Ginastera's Piano Sonata No.1, Florence Price's Piano Sonata in E minor, and Franz Liszt's Mephisto Waltz. Cann's commitment to audience enlightenment via storytelling was evident not only through her choice of repertoire, but also through the passion she exuded while performing and speaking about the music. The following morning, Ms. Cann returned to conduct a masterclass of grades 9-11 student winners from the 2024 GMTA State

Auditions. This dynamic session included a variety of works by Bach, Beach, Chopin, Debussy, Muczinski, played masterfully by our student performers. After both the concert and the masterclass, Ms. Cann remained to interact with conference attendees and sign CDs.

Alongside all of these incredibly inspiring performances and sessions, the conference was peppered with student winner performances, showcasing students from grades K/1 through collegiate who were winners at the 2024 GMTA State Auditions and the 2024 GMTA/MTNA Competitions. A special thank-you to Dr. Vicente Della Tonia (GMTA VP of Auditions) and Dr. Yanni Chan (GMTA VP of MTNA Competitions) for coordinating the many logistical details of these student concerts. Another special thank-you is also due to GSU – Perimeter College's music faculty for their varied and engaging vocal and instrumental

TEACHING TIPS

VICENTE DELLA TONIA, NCTM, GMTA 2024 TEACHER OF THE YEAR

I am deeply honored and humbled to receive GMTA's Teacher of the Year Award. I am grateful to share this moment with you! I would like to dedicate this award to my family, teachers, music colleagues and students—you inspire me!

Teaching, for me, is more than just a profession; it is a passion that I have cultivated since my teenage years. Each day, I feel incredibly blessed to do what I love, regardless of the challenges. A few colleagues have asked me how I avoid burnout. I tell them I simply remind myself to be thankful and truly live each moment of every day. That is my secret to maintaining enthusiasm and energy.

I also believe that having a curious mind and a hunger for knowledge keeps us youthful and drives us to continuously learn. For example, some close friends know that I am fluent in several languages, but I keep striving to learn new ones. This thirst for knowledge is something I live by and try to impart in my students. It is my teaching philosophy that everyone can achieve their goals if they truly desire them. This is why I stimulate my students to pursue their dreams with dedication, passion, and respect for what they do. Learning music reflects this philosophy—we devise a plan with clear goals and deadlines, ensuring that the process is focused and careful, and that music is polished. My ultimate goal is for students to embrace patience and fully commit themselves to the art of effective practice. Breaking down pieces into manageable chunks, focusing on trouble spots, analyzing, researching, along with slow and mental practice, for example, are a few techniques that hopefully will lead them to develop a system when practicing.

As a teacher, respecting everyone's voice is crucial, and providing honest feedback is key to fostering growth. Another fundamental belief of mine is that artistry must be nurtured from day one. How can we expect students to fall in love with the process if we allow them to play mechanically? We must help them access their emotions and life experiences to transmit their message through their playing. Therefore, listening to music with informed ears, engaging in research, singing, dancing, as well as developing critical listening skills, and providing honest and humble feedback are essential.

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


JOE CAMILLO, GMTA AWARDS CHAIR

Ian Evans Guthrie is a composer, performer, researcher, and collaborator, composing for acoustic and electroacoustic media from soloist through large ensembles. He has received the Mile High Freedom Band 2021 Commission, 1st prize for the Noosa-ISAM and Arcady Composition competitions, 2nd prize for the American Prize, a nomination from the American Academy of Arts and Letters, and other accolades. His works have been performed worldwide by the Mile High Freedom Band, Northwest Symphony Orchestra, fEARnoMUSIC, Ensemble Offspring, Interlochen Arts Camp, and others. His works will be featured in upcoming concerts in The Philippines, New York, and elsewhere. His most recent commissions include ones from Northwest Symphony Orchestra, Keum Hwa Cha, and others.



Guthrie maintains an active piano career, and has won 2nd prize in the Great Composers Competition: Music of America and many other awards. Additionally, he is a collaborative pianist for the Interlochen Arts Camp and other organizations.

Guthrie received his DM from Florida State University, where he studied composition with Ellen Taaffe Zwilich, Stephen Montague, Clifton Callender, Mark Wingate, and Ladislav Kubik. He is an Assistant Professor of Music at Calvary University, and serves on the boards of SCI, NACUSA, and CFAMC.

Many thanks to Robin Engleman, our long-time and immediate past GMTA Certification Chair, for featuring me in the Fall 2024 newsletter. In the past two decades, she has been a friend, a mentor who guided me through the MTNA Certification process, and a past GMTA President, who introduced to me many topnotch musicians through GMTA to refresh my teaching philosophy. I am very excited about being your new Certification Chair and would love to help you become a Nationally Certified Teacher of Music.

As of November 30, GMTA had a membership of 548 and of those, 78 are nationally certified. We tied with South Carolina for being ranked 28th at 14.2% of our members certified.

Congratulations to Julie Groom, the newly certified NCTM in Piano. After graduating from West Georgia with a Bachelor of Music Degree in Piano Performance and Pedagogy, Julie has taught piano and voice for over 20 years; in the past five years she has devoted a full-time schedule for teaching piano, voice, beginner guitar/ukulele, as well as performing and accompanying. She has been a member of MTNA for many years and is the current president of the Western Georgia MTA. In April 2023, she decided to begin her national certification process in Piano, and on February 6th, 2024, she received her National Certification. file Projects and Administrative Verification Process. Julie applied and was certified by the former.

She generously shares her process below.



"One required project is the written teaching philosophy, and there are five key characteristics.

How do you know if you are a successful teacher? There are many ways to assess this, and I encourage you to read Dr. Martha Baker-Jordan's book, <u>Practical Piano Pedagogy</u>; The Definitive Text for Piano Teachers and Pedagogy Students.

What goals and expectations do I require from my students? I communicate my expectations concerning practice and performance requirements through weekly lesson practice sheets addressing Lesson, Performance, Theory, Technique and Sight-reading.

Does my studio environment provide a space for continued growth? One way in which I do this is through a monthly newsletter featuring a "student of the month."

Am I adaptable? My tag line for my studio is encouraging music education for the next generation. I am a conceptual teacher—I observe and meet my students where they are at.

What do I need to do for ME to continue to be a successful teacher? I make a point to attend either a workshop or conference at least two times a year. I also focus on webinars, articles, composer biographies, etc.

I aspire to create lifelong learning, critical thinking skills and expression, and growth through music. What is your teaching philosophy? For any questions, please feel free to reach out to me at bellagstudio@aol.com."

THEORY REPORT

The updated curriculum for the GMTA and GATE Theory Tests was presented at the end of the summer of 2024. The 12 levels of curriculum and first set of practice tests and some informational files are on the GMTA website. The curriculum is posted on the "GMTA Theory" page of the website because the curriculum is the same for both the GATE tests and the GMTA tests. The GATE practice tests are posted on the "GATE Theory" page and the GMTA practice tests are posted on the "GMTA Theory" page.

The GATE 2024-2025 tests are required for participating in the GMTA Auditions. These tests are to be returned to the GATE Administration Chairman, Colette Keogh, NCTM, by March 1, 2025, in order for students to be eligible for participation! This year the grades will not count and the information gathered by the theory committee will be used for future tests. This fall there were 65 students registered to take the GATE theory test and 158 registered to take the GMTA theory test. All of the tests have been graded and teachers informed of the results. The exemption list will be updated in January and posted on the website.

Please email me at <u>dianelboyd@comcast.net</u> if you find corrections that need to be made to the exemption list after it is posted. Registration for all GATE and GMTA Theory tests for the "spring" is Jan. 15, 2025. No registrations will be accepted after that date. Please note that registration is online so don't wait until the last minute to register your students in case of a system crash or problem. Again, remember that GATE tests are required to be taken and returned to Colette by March 1, 2025, for eligibility for competition. It's rare in my experience as a teacher to find a pre-college student who is not familiar with Beethoven. What is surprising and shocking to many of my students, is that he was deaf for the final 20 years of his life and yet managed to write many of his masterpieces during that period.

Music is primarily an auditory experience and our enjoyment of this sound is dependent on good hearing acuity. As music educators, perhaps the story of Beethoven gives us a segue into a discussion with our students, on the topic of hearing protection.

Noise induced hearing loss (NIHL) affects 40 million adults aged 20-60 years in the USA and is preventable. NIHL is the only type of hearing loss that is completely preventable. The third leading cause of chronic disease in the USA, NIHL is on the rise. The CDC estimates that the incidence of NIHL is expected to double by 2060.

Recently, one of my students exclaimed that he experienced ringing in his ears (tinnitus) for three days following a school music event. Several of my teen students who attended this event complained about the noise levels, yet the only student who wore protective earplugs was an elementary student in the company of her parent.

I became concerned when through discussion with various parents and students it became evident that this was not an isolated incident but that many of the recent school events had similarly damaging noise levels.

According to the CDC, 50% of the population aged between 12 and 35 years is at risk of hearing loss due to excessive sound exposure in recreational settings.

In the past, it has been difficult for the average person to quantify noise levels but thanks to cell phone apps, this is no longer the case.

The free "NIOSH app" will appeal to our teens who can use it to monitor decibel levels at events. This app can provide our students with the knowledge required to evaluate noise levels and exposure duration. A good rule of thumb is to avoid noises that are too loud, too close, or last too long.

With increasing recreational use of headphones and earpods, levels of exposure due to prolonged us-

age have increased significantly. The CDC now rates 70dBA as the safe upper limit for prolonged exposure (more than 8 hours per day).

Noise levels at which damage occurs:

- 85 dBA and last a few hours.
- 100 dBA and last at least 14 minutes.
- 110 dBA and last at least 2 minutes.

Short term exposure at levels above 100dB can cause longterm damage. Many concerts and events produce sound at 110dB or even higher, so it is essential that our students be prepared and carry foam earplugs with them.

Another useful cell phone tool is a function located in 'sound and haptic settings' for headphone safety which allows one to monitor sound exposure due to headphone usage. This will send warning notifications when weekly safe exposure levels are exceeded, based on WHO recommendations. The smart watch also has a similar feature. Yesterday one of my 13 year old students demonstrated the audio safety features of his apple watch.

Of course, there are several other environmental sources of noise exposure at damaging levels.

Imagine my surprise on a recent transatlantic flight when I put my newly downloaded NOISH app to the test only to find the continuous noise range of 95dBA to 100 dBA. Adults often use noise cancelling headphones on flights, but are parents aware of the risk of this prolonged exposure to their children's hearing.

Dr. Ruth Reisman (audiologist) remarks that it is surprising that in today's world where prophylactic care of children's teeth and eyes is routine, the ears are mostly overlooked. Hearing is only addressed when problems arise.

Hearing loss contributes to a significant decrease in quality of life in the 21st century, as in the time of Beethoven. As music educators we can effect change by first educating our students and their parents.
