2009 TEACHERS OF THE YEAR William and Mary Ann Knight By Keith Defoor

The recipients of the 2009 GMTA Teachers of the Year are William (Bill) and Mary Ann Knight from Rome.

Raised in Louisiana and South Carolina, Bill studied with Jack Radunsky at the Oberlin Conservatory of Music where he received the Bachelor of Music Degree in Piano Performance. Subsequently, Bill studied with Dr. Earl Stout at Louisiana State University where he received the Master of Music Degree in Piano Performance. Bill taught at the Rathburn Conservatory of Music in New Jersey from 1957-1959. From 1959-1963, Bill was an independent music teacher in Atlanta. In 1963, Bill began teaching at Shorter College, where he served for over four decades. Bill retired from Shorter College in 2005 with the title Distinguished Professor of Piano.

A native of New Jersey, Mary Ann studied at the Juilliard School of Music with Cecily Lambert throughout high school. Mary Ann studied with Joseph Hungate at the Oberlin Conservatory of Music where she received the Bachelor of Music Degree in Piano Performance. Mary Ann received the Master of Music Degree in Piano Performance from the University of *(CONTINUED ON PAGE 3)*

West Georgia, where she studied with George Mann. Mary Ann taught at the Rathburn Conservatory of Music in New Jersey from 1957-1959. From 1960-1962, Mary Ann taught at South Cobb High School, where her duties included teaching private piano lessons, directing a choir, teaching theory classes, and directing musical theatre productions! In 1965, Mary Ann began teaching at Shorter College, where she has served for the past 44 years.

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An active recitalist throughout his career, Bill has performed across the southern United States as well as in California, New Mexico, Honduras, and Costa Rica. In addition, Bill has performed in recital at Carnegie Hall.

Mary Ann has presented master classes and pedagogy workshops in California, New Mexico, and throughout the southeastern United States. Mary Ann has been a featured presenter at several GMTA conferences and for numerous local associations. Mary Ann is presently editing a book, MAK'S ALMANAK," subtitled "Your Own Personal Pedagogy Course."

Both Bill and Mary Ann have been very active adjudicators of piano competitions throughout the Southeast.

To honor and celebrate the accomplishments of the Knights, Shorter College established the William and Mary Ann Knight Performance Competition in 2002. This endowed annual competition is a high profile event for the School of the Arts at Shorter College.

Bill's and Mary Ann's teaching excellence is borne out by the fact that they have collectively produced 194 student winners in GMTA/MTNA competitions. While the Knights have had so many successful students, their colleagues are quick to point out that Bill and Mary Ann have worked hard with *all* their students, not just the most gifted.

A teacher said of Bill and Mary Ann: "If I had to pick only one word to describe the Knights, I would choose the adjective *generous*. At Shorter College, the Knights consistently worked with their students far beyond regular lesson times. If their students had out of town performances or auditions, they frequently traveled to hear them. Quite often they invited students who were far away from home into their own home for holidays. Not surprisingly, practically all of their students think of the Knights as a second set of parents!"

Bill and Mary Ann Knight were nominated for the 2009 GMTA Teachers of the Year Award by George Mann, Rebekah Jones, and Emma Pettyjohn. Congratulations, Bill and Mary Ann!

CONFERENCE HEADLINER REPO

Choosing repertoire for a concert program can be challenging, and it requires a good deal of thought encompassing a variety of parameters. Offering a program that focuses on the works of only one composer is particularly daring. Conference attendees at Friday evening's recital enjoyed a rare opportunity in this respect when pianist, David Northington, featured several works by Aaron Copland.

Copland was one of the most important American composers of the Twentieth Century. In many respects, the arc of his personal stylistic evolution as a composer reflects many of the compositional trends that emerged during this period. Northington grasped this fact clearly as reflected in his program choices: the dissonance associated with Copland's early works was balanced against emerging styles such as blues and jazz, as well as the reassertion of tonality as a valid compositional device.

He opened the program with the Three Moods (1920 - 21). These pieces are concise gems and deserve to be heard more frequently. Each work has both technical and musical challenges to be sure, and their vastly different characters provide a good deal of contrast within the set. These pieces were the perfect opportunity for Northington to demonstrate his incredibly wide-

ranging tonal palate. The dissonant opening of *Embittered* was arresting. Northington's clarity of articulation produced a tone slightly tinged with an acidity of mood for me. This, in turn, was beautifully tempered and contrasted by his more playful approach to the middle section. *Wistful* was a masterful display of tonal shading under Northington's hands, while *Jazzy*, whose outer sections were delivered with a rollicking sense of humor, offered him a chance to display his soulful side in the bluesy middle section.

The Piano Sonata (1939 - 41), is a large-scale, three movement work. The sonata enjoyed a brief resurgence of interest among composers in the American school during the early to middle part of the Twentieth Century. Although less frequently performed perhaps, this sonata is well composed and tightly organized. The opening movement, Molto moderato, exhibits many characteristics of sonata form. opening motive, a descending three-chord figure centered in b-flat minor, becomes the genesis for development throughout the movement. Northington's interpretative approach was very straightforward and bold. His sensitivity to tonal shading supported the motivic development in this movement beautifully. The second movement, Vivace, is a virtuosic tour-de-force: the syncopated rhythms, mixed meters, wide leaps, and infusion of blues-influenced scalar devices are very challenging. Northington was very much at home in this movement, delivering the playful melodic figures with clarity and nuance. The last movement, Andante

sostenuto, is perhaps the most mercurial of the three. Motivically, there are connections to the first movement, Molto moderato, yet the overall homophonic texture used is a stark contrast to the compositional devices in the two movements which precede it. Northington's tone was resonant, and again, his ability to provide widely contrasting tonal shading was demonstrated beautifully.

Following this work, Northington turned to Copland's humorous side and played the ever popular scherzo, *The Cat and the Mouse*. This was quite simply a delightful, playful performance, full of vitality.

As a composer, Copland was able to explore the American popular musical landscape, tapping into the richness of cultural diversity from the streets of New York to the folk song inspirations familiar to the Great Plains and the "Wild West." The second half of the program featured the Four Piano Blues, revealing Copland's further exploration with elements of jazz and blues styles. These works, like the Three Moods, deserve wider recognition. Their individual characters are distinct and unique. It was good to hear them as a set, too. I enjoyed Northington's performance very much. He struck a delicate balance in Freely Poetic, allowing his use of rubato to give this movement a sense of being created "in the *(continued on page 5)*"

moment." The second and third movements, *Soft and Languid*, and *Muted and Sensuous* were just that: evocative with warmth of tone. *With Bounce* was appropriately lively.

The program concluded with a return to the dissonance associated with some works of Copland's early years. Northington chose to end with the Piano Variations (1930). This is perhaps one of Copland's finest compositions. The theme is built on four tones, and the composer experiments with overtones in the opening. The ensuing variations build on one another, becoming increasingly more complex as the variations evolve. The variety of rhythmic, harmonic, and thematic manipulation seems inexhaustible. The full capabilities of the piano's range and tonal palate are demanded, and the work equally taxes those of the pianist as well. This was perhaps Northington's finest playing of the evening. From the smallest pianissimo to the fullest fortissimo, he drew upon a wide range of articulation, tonal color and nuance, delivering a first rate performance.

As encores, Northington offered additional glimpses into the mind of Copland by playing a transcription from the film score, *Our Town*, as well as the ballet score, *Rodeo*, performing the *Hoedown* from the latter. Both works were vehicles that demonstrated his technical prowess and musical savvy.

We were fortunate indeed to have had this opportunity to hear a very gifted pianist, David Northington, and to enjoy his wonderful artistry!

2009 GMTA CONFERENCE By DAWN HARMON MCCORD | Vice President Programming GMTA

The 2009 GMTA Conference was held on the campus of Shorter College in Rome, Georgia, Nov. 5-7, 2009. David Northington presented an all-Copland concert and led a successful master class. Scott McBride Smith presented three pedagogy sessions that were well received. Dr. Smith has since provided a great offer for our members to preview his series, *American Popular Piano*. Sorrell Hays premiered "Fanfare Cosmos," a newly composed work for a chamber ensemble using themes from *TOOWHOPERA*. Along with the commissioned work, *TOOWHOPERA* was also performed on Thursday evening. In addition to traditional instruments and exceptional performers from the Georgia and Tennessee music community, the commissioned work featured gamelan, an Indonesian ensemble composed mainly of tuned percussion instruments.

The Northington and TOOWHOPERA concerts and other diverse performances were featured throughout the conference including our own Audition and Competition Winners as well as member sessions that focused on a theme or pedagogical topic. At our banquet, Shorter faculty performed selections from well-known and loved opera scenes. New Orleans author, Craig Cortello, opened our conference with his experiences in the business world as presented in his newest book, *Everything We Needed to Know About Business, We Learned Playing Music.* Cortello's session highlighted nine lessons learned, attributes developed, and insights gained through the experience and personal accounts of business leaders. The session reminded us that we must advocate for the value of music in our society. Cortello states that:

The discipline that musicians must possess to develop their craft to the point that they are even ready to share their talents on any significant level is often under appreciated. How many times had Joe Pass played a scale on the guitar, put chords and bass lines together in interesting combinations, or simply run through fingering techniques to stay sharp and limber? I don't know the answer, but when I hear his recordings, contemplating those questions is mind boggling.

Cortello challenged us to share why learning about music is not a luxury but is obligatory.

GMTA members shared their knowledge and experience adding to the success to the conference. There were 00 performers and presenters scheduled for this conference. There were 4 sessions with a focus on repertoire and performance, 5 on pedagogical and technique issues, and one on MTNA certification.

Fourteen members served as presiders acting as session hosts in order to assure that presenters had site support as well as a warm welcome and thank you from a colleague. Along with a relevant and motivating program of sessions and performances, the success of the conference was insured by the opportunity to mingle with colleagues. Social interactions were facilitated by the Rome music teachers providing hospitality, Donna Trivette organizing the details of registration and publications, and President Sweatman supplying a keen attention to detail and willingness to do anything that was needed. Many thanks are offered to Shorter faculty who not only worked tirelessly to see that our needs were met but went over and beyond the call of duty to see that all ran smoothly. Fred Tarrant spent months preparing for the conference and Ben Harris came in the final weeks and worked tirelessly to keep the wheels greased and running smoothly.

Recommendations for sessions at the 2010 conference are being received and proposal applications will be on the GMTA Website after the first of the year. Next year's conference will be Nov. 4-6 at Augusta State University.

IN MEMORIAM

Long time GMTA member Kenneth Fischer, a renowned saxophone soloist and professor in the University of Georgia's Hugh Hodgson School of Music, has died following a brief illness. After being awarded his Doctor of Music with Distinction in Performance from Indiana University, he joined the UGA faculty in 1979.

A frequent contributor to *The Saxophone Journal*, he authored numerous articles on repertoire and pedagogy. Fischer was an outstanding performer and appeared as a soloist at numerous meetings of the World Saxophone Congress, including the world premieres of several works dedicated to him. In 1987, Fischer was awarded a Soloist Recording Grant from the National Endowment for the Arts for the recording of original works for the saxophone. Fischer's recordings are available from the Educational Music Service, Coronet Records and ACA Digital Recording labels.



"Dr. Fischer was a brilliant musician, an artist admired by all who knew him," said Dale Monson, director of the music school. "He was also a dynamic and

international leader in his profession, as well as here at UGA. For more than thirty years he led one of the finest saxophone studios in the world."

Fischer's accolades and achievements are accompanied by wide-ranging respect and affection from international colleagues, whom he regularly brought to UGA to perform and interact with his students. Most recently the Zagreb Saxophone Quartet completed a one-week residency at the music school in October, conducting master classes, coaching ensembles and performing. "It's important for our students to be able to work with such musicians and to get them to know them not only as performers and teachers, but also as human beings," Fischer said at the time.

GMTA ANNUAL BUSINESS MEETING MINUTES Shorter College, Rome, Georgia November 6, 2009

WELCOME

The 2009 Annual Business Meeting of the Georgia Music Teachers Association was called to order at 3:00 PM in the Brooks Chapel at Shorter College. President Sweatman welcomed the GMTA membership to the conference and extended appreciation to the faculty and staff of Shorter College for hosting the conference and the competitions.

President Sweatman introduced Dr. Harold Newman, President of Shorter College, who extended greetings to our membership on behalf of the college.

The minutes from the Annual 2008 Business Meeting were approved as stated in the Summer issue of the GMTA Newsletter. The Financial Report for fiscal year 2008-2009, as compiled by Haley and Associates, showed total revenues of \$75,296.00 and total expenses of \$71, 502.64, resulting in a net surplus of \$3,793.36. The report was accepted.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

In January, 2009, President Sweatman attended the MTNA Southern Division Competitions held at Virginia State University in Petersburg, Virginia. From Georgia, there were four winners, three alternates and 2 honorable mentions. William May, student of Alfred Cohen, was the winner in the Young Artist Composition Division. Zachary Bryant, student of Earl Coleman, won the Senior Voice Division; Chelsea Hoover, student of Jean Martin-Williams, won the Senior Brass Division; Rachel Roby, student of Linda Lister, won the Young Artist Voice Division. The winners traveled to Atlanta in March to the MTNA National Conference. Zachary Bryant won third place in the Senior Performance Voice Competition; Rachel Roby received second place in the Young Artist Performance Voice Competition and William May received third place in the Young Artist Composition.

President Sweatman attended the 2009 MTNA Conference in March in Atlanta and also served on the MTNA program committee for this conference. It was an outstanding conference featuring wonderful sessions and recitals and it was wonderful to have Atlanta as the host site for this conference. The 2010 GMTA Conference will be held at Augusta State University in Augusta and the 2011 Conference will be held in Columbus. The 2010 MTNA Conference will be March 20-24 in Albuquerque, New Mexico. The 2011 MTNA Conference will be in Milwaukee; 2012 Conference will be held in New York City.

The GMTA Auditions were held April 17-18 at Kennesaw University under the supervision of VP/Auditions, Rebekah Jones. There were a total of 565 participants. Participants included 454 Pre-College Piano, 16 High School Piano Concerto, 36 College Piano, 30 High School and College Voice, 17 K-College strings, 7 High School and College Brass and Woodwinds and 5 Instrumental Concerto participants. We thank Jason Bennett for his work with our theory area. 207 students took the theory exam, representing a 12% increase from 2008. The testing will continue to occur only at the local level. Detailed information regarding these exams is located on our web site. We thank David Watkins and Kennesaw State University for hosting our State Auditions. The 2010 auditions will again be held at Kennesaw State University.

The MTNA Competitions were held this week, November 2-5, on the Shorter College campus under the supervision of Peggy Lee, VP/Competitions. There were 71 solo entrants, 3 Senior Piano duets and 1 chamber ensemble in the Performance Competitions. There were 17 entrants in the Composition Competitions. This year 9 solo winners, 4 composition winners, 1 piano duet winner, and 1 chamber ensemble winners will represent GMTA in the MTNA Southern Division Competitions in January 2010.

As of October 15, 2009, GMTA has 691 members. The number of professional and senior members: 660; number of student members: 31; number of certified members: 102. The number of registrants for our 2009 conference is 105.

The bank balance as of October 15 is \$16,162. 45. The balance in our reserve fund is \$60,923.23. The amount in our Composition Award Fun is \$7537.00. The amount in the Broadhurst Award Fund is \$11,365.00 and the amount in the GMTA Award Fund is \$8971.50.


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
