2010 TEACHER OF THE YEAR LOIS FINLAY

The recipient of the 2010 GMTA Teacher of the Year is Lois Finlay. A native of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, Lois received a Bachelor of Science Degree in Piano Performance from the Julliard School of Music as a student of Katherine Bacon and a Master of Science Degree in Piano Performance, also from the Julliard School of Music, as a student of Adele Marcus.

In 1971, Lois moved to Georgia and has been a member of GMTA and the North DeKalb Music Teachers Association ever since.

Lois has a vast array of highly successful teaching experiences. She has been an independent music teacher in Pittsburgh, Atlanta, and Clarkesville. Also, Lois has been a music faculty member at Mercer University (Atlanta), the Georgia Governors Honors Program, the Cambridge Academy of Music (Atlanta), and North Georgia College and State University.

Lois has also served as Chair of the Fine Arts Department at Mercer University in Atlanta.

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Lois's students have won numerous prestigious awards. Lois has produced three state winners of GMTA/MTNA Senior Performance Competitions, two Southern Division winners of MTNA Senior Performance Competitions, four state winners of GMTA/MTNA Junior Performance Competitions, three winners of GMTA Piano Concerto Competitions, and two winners of GMEA Piano Concerto Competitions.

Lois has twice received the North DeKalb Music Teachers Association Teacher of the Year Award.

A fellow GMTA member says the following regarding Lois: "Her students routinely place high in competitions and a goodly number of them continue their piano studies in colleges or conservatories and have careers in music. She knows just how and when to present the right composition to students. She combines these skills with seemingly endless enthusiasm and energy. She never stops! She is always available to her students, even attending their competitions when they are out-of-state."

A parent says this of Lois: "Our decision to have our son take lessons from Lois Finlay was the best decision we ever made for his musical development. Her approach to teaching always seems to put the students' needs first. She spent many hours preparing and practicing concertos with our son and arranged for him to have duet partners every year. She gave much thought to the repertoire she chose for our son, taking into consideration his tastes and his need to explore literature outside his past experience. 

AUGUSTA | GEORGIA PRESIDENT'S REPORT

In January, 2010, President Sweatman attended the MTNA Southern Division Competitions held at Samford University in Birmingham, Alabama. From Georgia, there were 3 winners, 3 alternates and 1 honorable mention. Barret Ham, student of Montgomery Cole, was the winner in the Junior Woodwind Division. Jing Yan, student of Sergiu Schwartz, was the winner in the Young Artist String Division and Noah Andrews, student of Gayle Vann, was the winner in the Elementary Composition Competition. The winners traveled to Albuquerque in March to the MTNA National Conference. Coraine Tate, student of Earl Coleman, competed as an alternate and placed 2nd in the Senior Voice Competition. Jing Yang placed 2nd in the Young Artist String Competitions.

President Sweatman attended the 2010 MTNA Conference in March in Albuquerque, New Mexico. It was a wonderful conference which featured great sessions and recitals. The 2011 MTNA Conference will be in Milwaukee, Wisconsin and the 2012 MTNA Conference will be in New York City. Our 2011 GMTA Conference will be held at Columbus State University in Columbus.

The GMTA Auditions were held April 16-17 at Kennesaw University under the supervision of VP/GMTA Auditions, Rebekah Jones. There were a total of 545 participants. Participants included 426 Pre-College Piano, 11 High School Piano Concerto. 29 College Piano, 28 High School and College Voice, 42 K-College Strings, 1 Brass and Woodwinds, 1 Guitar and 7 Instrumental Concerto participants. We also thank Jason Bennett for his work as our Theory Chair. 244 students took the theory exam, representing a 18% increase from 2009. The testing will continue to occur only at the local level. Detailed information regarding theory is located on our web site. We thank David Watkins and Kennesaw State University for hosting our GMTA Auditions. The 2011 auditions will again be held at Kennesaw State University.

The GMTA/MTNA Competitions were held this week, November 1-4, on the Augusta State University campus under the supervision of Peggy Lee, VP/Competitions. There were 68 solo entrants, 4 Senior Piano duets and 2 chamber ensembles in the Performance Competitions. There were 9 entrants in the Composition Competitions. Gayle Vann is our Composition Coordinator and we also thank her for her work in this area. This year 10 solo winners, 4 composition winners, 1 piano duet and 1 chamber ensemble will represent GMTA in the MTNA Southern Division Competitions in January 2011 at Columbus State University.

As of October 15, 2010, GMTA has 717 members (and increase of 26 members from this time last year). The number of professional and senior members is 668; number of student members is 49 (an increase of 18 members); number of certified members is 111 (an increase of 9). The number of registrants for our 2010 conference is 133.

The bank balance as of October 15 is \$29,768.74. The balance in our reserve fund is \$49,355.10. The amount in our Composition Award Fund is \$7,599.48. The amount in the Broadhurst Award Fund is \$11,782.99 and the amount in the GMTA Award Fund is \$9,279.81.

FEATURE ARTICLE

Are you a creature of habit? Do you have a favorite method book series that you use with all your beginning students? Do you find yourself teaching Burgmuller's "Ballade," C.P.E. Bach's "Solfegietto," and Beethoven's "For Elise" every year in preparation for Federated Festival? Did you want to run screaming from your music studio the hundredth time you heard a youngster play "Jingle Bells" last month?

When I was in high school, I had a chemistry instructor who had used the same textbook for years and taught every day from a box of note cards she had prepared to correlate with it. This made her job easy and predictable, but we students were as bored with the subject and disengaged from the classroom as she appeared to be.

I am a firm believer in the "if it ain't broke, don't fix it" philosophy, but I don't want to be boring and predictable, either. Here are few tips for keeping yourself fresh.

1. TRY SOME NEW TEACHING MATERIALS.

I have my go-to method books and supplementary materials, but there are great new items being published every day, and many of them are worth exploring. Visit your local music store and check out their new releases; add your contact information to publisher mailing lists for late-breaking information and special offers; try using a different curriculum with a new student. You will be exposed to alternate means of presentation that you might be able to apply to the tried-and-true series, and sometimes sharing an old concept in a new way is all it takes to create a light bulb moment in a student.

2. EXPERIMENT WITH YOUR LESSON FORMAT.

Do you teach nothing but 30-minute private lessons every week? Try substituting a group lesson once a month or once a quarter. Small groups can provide you with a forum to work on elements of music theory or music history that are often crowded out of private lessons and create additional performance opportunities for your students. Last year, I set up small group performances at area assisted living centers for my students in lieu of their regular private lessons one week during the month of December. This was an overwhelmingly positive experience for the residents and my students alike, and it was striking how much more comfortable the children were playing in front of an audience during the spring recital.

3. MEET YOUR STUDENTS WHERE THEY ARE.

Sure, there's a part of me that wishes every child would be content working his way through all four or five levels of a method book and then move directly into the classics, but that simply isn't the case. Sometimes, the only way to capture a student's interest – and keep it – is to choose age-appropriate materials that don't seem alien to his musical sensibilities. This is especially true for middle school and high school students. Consider "Way Cool Keyboarding" by Will Baily (available from Pedagogy in Motion, http://www.everylifeneedsmusic.com/MM.htm) for beginners; investigate the music of neoclassical composers such as David Lanz (http://davidlanz.com), Joseph Akins (http://josephakins.com), and David Nevue (http://davidnevue.com) for older students and adults. David Nevue's website even categorizes his sheet music by degree of difficulty. Neoclassical pieces afford students the opportunity to make some of their own choices concerning fingers, dynamics and rubato and to recognize classical harmonies and musical forms. Best of all, they often sound more difficult than they actually are. Some of my students refuse to play anything that isn't neoclassical; that's okay with me, as long as they are playing.

4. CHALLENGE YOURSELF AS A MUSICIAN.

Has it been thirty years since you had a piano lesson? Have you let your own practice fall by the wayside? Consider private lessons for yourself, maybe dabbling in a style of music you aren't familiar or comfortable with, like blues or jazz; take advantage of performance opportunities offered by your local association; memorize a solo or polish a duet with an older student to perform in your own spring recital. Our students will benefit from our good examples, and we will gain greater empathy for them as a result of more recent experience in the "hot seat."

5. BECOME MORE INVOLVED IN THE MUSICAL COMMUNITY

You wouldn't be reading this article if you weren't already a member of a local and state organization. But do you attend meetings regularly? Participate in local association events? Have you ever been to a state or national conference? We all have busy lives, but the support, inspiration, and motivation provided by our fellow teachers is invaluable. And consider the potential benefits of social networking. Do you tweet? Or have a Facebook page for your music studio? Many of us have websites by now, but opening a Twitter account or building a presence on Facebook is a great way to keep in touch with your students and their families and to be more "relevant" to them. I love it when I log into my Facebook account on a given morning and see a post on my wall (continued on pg. 8)

from a student looking forward to his piano lesson later that day. Sure, technology can be maddening, but it can also help us create a true online community.

I have never been big on New Year's resolutions; to me, every day is an opportunity to be a better teacher and musician than I was the day before. We don't allow our students to play piano in C position forever, do we? Neither should we allow ourselves to revert to the same old patterns day in and day out. I challenge you to join me in getting out of your comfort zone on a regular basis!

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2010 GMTA CONFERENCE REPORT

DAVID D'AMBROSIO VICE-PRESIDENT PROGRAM | GMTA

The 2010 Conference was held at Augusta State University in Augusta, Georgia, Nov. 4-6. Over 130 GMTA members registered and attended the conference. At the Friday evening banquet we congratulated our newly-installed Board Members and the 2010 Teacher of the Year, Lois Finlay.

Following the Conference Banquet, Jon Klibonoff, conference recitalist, presented a program of varied repertoire which was well received by the audience. The Saturday morning master class was also very successful not only due to the excellent musical advice offered to the students, but by Mr. Klibonoff's wonderful sense of humor.

Emma Pettyjohn and Rebekah Jones shared the successful teaching tips prepared by Mary Ann and Bill Knight. As former students, and with first-hand knowledge, they generously shared many facets of Mary Ann's pedagogical wisdom. The Knight's pedagogical suggestions were interspersed with humorous anecdotes.

Nelita True, conference headliner, presented two inspirational lectures; the first on the easier Chopin Preludes. She offered pedagogical ideas in the performance of these pieces including a logical way to approach rubato and suggestions on the various levels of pedaling technique. In the second presentation, a discussion of the Schubert Impromptus, Dr. True demonstrated how to engage students with imagination and an appropriate keyboard technique for these pieces. The concept of phrasing was demonstrated with body movement.

Two excellent presentations on keyboard masters Francois Couperin and C.P.E. Bach were offered by George Mann and David Murray, respectively. Elena Cholakova presented an interesting program outlining the differences in the editions of the Chopin Preludes and how they present the challenge of determining historically correct solutions regarding issues of interpretation. A lecture by Tom Pearsall which surveyed the piano music of Benjamin Britten piqued our interest about works which merit more attention than they currently receive. Stephanie Tingler and Martha Thomas delighted us with a program discussing the preparation of vocal solos utilizing a three-point strategy as a learning process for the vocalist as well as an approach to troubleshooting for the vocal accompanist. Sam Haasenritter, piano tuner and concert technician, demonstrated the possibilities of unlocking the piano's full potential.

Among several fine performances were the Augusta State University Orchestra and Concerto Winners. Martin David Jones and Clara Park, faculty members at Augusta State, were featured as the soloists in Bach's Concerto in C minor for Two Pianos with String Ensemble. It was a well-balanced, sensitive collaboration between the soloists and orchestra with Dr. Jones conducting from the keyboard. Another highlight was the performance of the commissioned work, "Observations" by composer Lee Johnson. Johnson conducted the work with The Chamber Chorus of LaGrange College (Debbie Ogle, Director) and the Piano Quintet from the LaGrange Symphony Orchestra New Music Ensemble.

Thank you to Rebekah Jones and Peggy Lee for their organization of the student recitals in which we heard a very high level of playing from our student performers.

Facilitating the many events and presentations were 12 presiders who offered their greetings and support to each of our presenters. Martin David Jones, our host faculty member at Augusta State University lent his support so that everything ran smoothly. Many thanks go to Edith Sweatman, President, and Dawn Harmon McCord, VP Programs, for their marvelous organizational skills resulting in a thoroughly successful conference. GMTA members in attendance also enjoyed numerous opportunities for social interaction and time to rekindle friendships with colleagues in our profession. We were afforded ample opportunities from both an educational and inspirational level this year.




At the 2010 GMTA conference, \$410 was collected. This amount brings our total for the year to \$3,172.00.

2010 GMTA COMMISSIONED COMPOSITION by KEITH DEFOOR

The 2010 GMTA Commissioned Composition is *Observations* by Lee Johnson, the Fuller E. Callaway Professor of Music at LaGrange College. Conducted by the composer, *Observations* was performed at the General Session on Friday, November 5 at the GMTA Annual Conference at Augusta State University by The Chamber Chorus of Lagrange College and a Piano Quintet from the LaGrange Symphony Orchestra New Music Ensemble.

Lee Johnson, who has been on the music faculty of LaGrange College since 1989, has composed a large body of work that includes symphonies, opera, concerti, musical, cantatas, chamber music, vocal and choral works, and symphonic film. Regarding the commissioned work, Professor Johnson states that "I have been interested in the subject matter that is found in the text for *Observations* for some time now and the GMTA/MTNA commission signaled to me that it was time to get this long desired piece off the ground."

Cast in two movements and based on a text by Lee Johnson and Clay Michael Powers, *Observations* is a vibrant and powerful work filled with colorful voicing and instrumentation. In the first movement, "Some Present Observations," a soprano soloist and women's chorus consider how events in the world often do not align well with man's "accepted conclusions." In the second movement, "Some of the Observers' Issues," a small vocal ensemble and the full choir note how some people perceive that God is not necessary—physical laws explain our world, while others believe that the world could not exist without God.

The performance by the LaGrange College ensembles of Professor Johnson's musically challenging work was very skilled, highly musical and extremely professional. Furthermore, Professor Johnson's conducting of his composition was exciting and precise.

Professor Johnson will be considered for the MTNA 2011 Distinguished Composer of the Year Award, which will be presented at the MTNA Conference in Milwaukee this March.

2010 GMTA HEADLINER CONCERT

The 2010 GMTA Conference attendees were treated to a stellar concert Friday evening by guest artist, Jon Klibonoff. Currently professor at the Manhattan School of Music, Klibonoff is the recipient of many awards, including the Silver Medal of the Gina Bachauer International Piano Competition and a Solo Recitalists Fellowship from the National Endowment for the Arts. Klibonoff is also the pianist in the Trio Solisti, described as "The most exciting piano trio in America" by *The New Yorker Magazine*. Although an almost last minute replacement for the ailing Julian Martin, Klibonoff's prowess as a seasoned and colorful artist shone through the entire program. As soon as he played his first opening phrase, the audience knew they were in for a real treat and a fine evening of great music making.

Klibonoff opened the program with the Ravel's *Valses Nobles et Sentimentales*. These rather elusive pieces were performed with great elegance and excellent pacing throughout. Klibonoff held the audience at rapt attention with his exquisite control of dynamics and pedal and produced a truly magical sound. His ability to unify compositions with an over-arching structure was readily apparent in this set as well as in all the works to follow. Klibonoff's sensitive touch and many layers of soft dynamic levels brought the art of shading and nuance to new heights in this opening selection.

The second work on the program featured *Drei Romanzen*, Opus 21; a set of three pieces by Clara Schumann. Klibonoff explained that the work was dedicated to Johannes Brahms, with the first movement reflecting the sadness Clara felt in Robert's life for his illness. Although this was Klibonoff's "maiden voyage" (his words) for the Schumann, there was nothing uneasy or uncertain about the performance of these lovely works. His performance introduced most of the audience to some hitherto unknown fine romantic compositions.

The first half concluded with a performance of Brahms *Klavierstucke*, Opus 119. Klibonoff's performance of Opus 119 emphasized the unity of the set and the dramatic difference between the first three pieces (all Intermezzi) and the 4th work, the Rhapsody in E-Flat Major, definitely my favorite of the opus. From the very strong, bold opening to the misterioso C minor section to the final remarkable Coda, Klibonoff maintained great tempo control and brought this dramatic Rhapsody to a very exciting close.

The final work on the program occupied the entire second half, Prokofiev's *Sonata No. 6 in A Major*, Opus 82. Besides the Ravel, this was probably the highlight of the concert for this listener. From the bold opening of the first movement with the insistent trumpet-like thirds motive to the Vivace of the 4th movement with its cacophonous ending, Klibonoff created an entire world in this sonata. Strong characterizations helped set each movement apart and unified the entire sonata by emphasizing and highlighting the recurring motives established in the first movement. As Klibonoff said in the master class the following day, pianists typically need to listen to piano music as if it were written for a symphony. He certainly created a symphony of sounds for the listener in this piece. An exquisite touch blended with a powerful interpretation coupled with remarkable tempo and dynamic control characterized this performance from start to finish.

Cherokee Music Teachers began our year in September with a delicious pot luck dinner and a planning meeting. We welcomed several new members.


