The history of the GMTA





CONFERENCE HEADLINER, ENRIQUE GRAF

Pianist Enrique Graf will perform on Friday evening at 8:15. "First Place Winner of the 1978 William Kapell International Piano Competition, Enrique Graf has played recitals, chamber music and has been soloist with orchestras all over the world. Graf was born in Montevideo, Uruguay, and is now an American Citizen. He received the Immigrant Achievement Award from American Immigration Law Foundation in Washington, DC. Tenor Placido Domingo, violinist Midori and Graf are the only three classical musicians to have received this honor. Enrique Graf has an expressive range that is known for its versatility." PEDAGOGY SPECIALIST, GAIL BERENSON

MTNA President, Gail Berenson, will speak at our business meeting and banquet, and give a presentation on performance anxiety. "Gail Berenson is Professor of Piano at Ohio

University, has served as Keyboard Division Chair for twenty-three years. She was awarded the "Distinguished Teacher of the Year" Award in 2000. Prior to her arrival at Ohio University in 1975, she taught at the University of Illinois, Urbana. An active performer and passionate chamber music collaborator, she performs with Cardinal Trio with Ohio University colleagues Marjorie Bagley, violin and Michael Carrera, cello and with flutist, Alison Brown Sincoff, as a member of the Ohio University Lyric Duo. As a result of her distinguished work as a piano pedagogue, along with her reputation as an expert on musician wellness issues, she is much in demand as a performer, clinician, master class artist, adjudicator, author, reviewer and pedagogy consultant. She has performed and lectured in over thirty states, as well as Great Britain, Belgium, Switzerland, Israel, Portugal and Canada. She was a presenter at the European Piano Teachers Conference in Manchester, England in 2005 and in Funchal, Madeira in 2006.

Ms. Berenson is one of the co-authors of A Symposium for Pianists and Teachers: Strategies to Develop Mind and Body for Optimal Performance and, as a member of the Lorenz Advisory contributed Board she to the innovative piano method, Piano Discoveries, and is co-author of "Ask the Professor". She also authored a chapter entitled, "Music Medicine and Today's Piano Teachers," for the third edition of James Lyke's book, Creative Piano Teaching. frequent author for Keyboard Companion, she has also written for the on-line journal, Piano Pedagogy Forum and served as a contributing editor to Piano & Keyboard.

She is the national President of Music Teachers National Association, an association of 24,000 members. She has also held the position of President-Elect, Vice President, Chair of the 2002

and 2003 MTNA National Conference Committees, served on the 1996 and 1997 Conference Committees and was one of the founding members of the MTNA Pedagogy Committee. She has held several national posts with the National Conference on Piano Pedagogy and the World Piano Pedagogy Conference and has chaired National Conference on Keyboard Pedagogy's Wellness for Pianists Committee. A past president of the Ohio Music Teachers Association, she holds MTNA's Master Certificate in piano and piano pedagogy and was the recipient of the 1999 OMTA "Certified Teacher of the Year" award and the 2004 OMTA "Collegiate Teacher of the Year" award. students are performing and teaching in independent studios and on college faculties throughout the world. "GEORGIA'S OWN" CONFERENCE PRESENTERS

This year's conference presentations bring many of Georgia's finest pianists and teachers together. Mary Ann Knight, Peter Jutras, David D'Ambrosio, George Mann, Ruth Oi Choo Fung, You Ju Lee, Kris Carlisle and Sergio Gallo will be session presenters. Composer sessions designed to revitalize your teaching repertoire will focus on Scarlatti, Schumann, Kabalvesky, and Marga Richter, as well as Brazilian music and contemporary piano sonatas. The three pedagogical sessions are designed to invigorate your studio teaching. Topics covered will be adjudication, motivation, and performance anxiety.

Thursday evening's concert will feature GMTA student winners and several of "Georgia's Own" performers. GMTA Instrumental Concerto winner Lela Norris (student of Jennifer Lee) will perform the first movement of the Bruch *Violin Concerto in G minor*. GMTA Piano Concerto winner Kenny Zhao (student of Fred Hsiang) will perform the first movement of the Rachmaninoff *Piano Concerto No. 2 in C minor*. Keith and Priscilla Jefcoat will be performing piano music for four hands and Regina Zona, soprano, will perform some selections with pianist David Oliver. The evening will conclude

with the premiere performance of Geoffrey Haydon's 2007 GMTA Commissioned Composition.



North Georgia College and State University, Dahlonega, Georgia

NOTE: Conference **Parking** will be at: Dahlonega Baptist Church / 234 Hawkins Street / Dahlonega, GA 30533 Conference **Registration** will be at the Hoag Student Center of North Georgia College & State University

From Atlanta , GA : Take GA 400/US 19 north toward Dahlonega. Travel north on GA 400 until ends at GA 60/US 19 (approx. 56 miles). Turn left on GA60/US 19. Travel north toward the city of Dahlonega . Travel to the first stoplight on to GA 60/US 19 (business). Continue straight through this light on Hwy. 19/60 Business. After passing Dairy Queen on the right, you will see the main NGCSU entrance on the left. DO NOT USE THIS ENTRANCE for audition or conference parking. Instead continue north six blocks to the public square. At the public square, follow the traffic circle (one-way to the right) 270 degrees around the gold museum. Exit the square heading west on Hwy 9/52 Business (West Main Street) Continue ahead two blocks, passing BB&T on the right. Turn right at the next intersection on Church Street. Continue two blocks and as the road curves to the right, watch for Dahlonega Baptist Church parking signs on the left. For Hoag Student Center access, walk back down Church Street two blocks to West Main Street. The Hoag Center is across the intersection and to the right. (Approx. drive time from I-285: 1 hour)

From Athens / Gainsville , GA : Take US 129 N to Gainesville , GA. Go straight onto GA 60 N and follow it into the city of Dahlonega (approx. 20 mi.). Travel to the first stoplight on to GA 60 / US 19 (business). Continue straight through this light on Hwy. 19/60 Business. After passing Dairy Queen on the right, you will see the main NGCSU entrance on the left. DO NOT USE THIS ENTRANCE for audition or conference parking. Instead continue north six blocks to the public square. At the public square, follow the traffic circle (one-way to the right) 270 degrees around the gold museum. Exit the square heading west on Hwy 9/52 Business (West Main Street)Continue ahead two blocks, passing BB&T on the right. Turn right at the next intersection on Church Street. Continue two blocks and as the road curves to the right, watch for Dahlonega Baptist Church parking signs on the left. For Hoag Student Center access, walk back down Church Street two blocks to West Main Street. The Hoag Center is across the intersection and to the right. (Approx. drive time from downtown Athens: 90 min.)

From Augusta , GA: Travel I-20 W to 285 North, to GA 400/Us 19 North toward Dahlonega. Travel north on GA 400/US 19 until it ends at GA 60/US 19 (approx. 56 miles). Turn left on GA 60/US 19. Travel north toward the city of Dahlonega . Travel to the first stoplight on to GA 60/US 19 (business). Continue straight through this light on Hwy. 19/60 Business. After passing Dairy Queen on the right, you will see the main NGCSU entrance on the left. DO NOT USE THIS ENTRANCE for audition or conference parking. Instead continue north six blocks to the public square. At the public square, follow the traffic circle (one-way to the right) 270 degrees around the gold museum. Exit the square heading west on Hwy 9/52 Business (West Main Street)Continue ahead two blocks, passing BB&T on the right. Turn right at the next intersection on Church Street. Continue two blocks and as the road curves to the right, watch for Dahlonega Baptist Church parking signs on the left. For Hoag Student Center access, walk back down Church Street two blocks to West Main Street. The Hoag Center is across the intersection and to the right. (Approx. drive time 3 hours)

From Macon / Savannah , GA: Take I-75 N to Atlanta, GA. In Atlanta, take I-85 N. Bear right onto GA 400. Travel north on GA 400 until ends at GA 60/US 19 (approx. 56 miles). Turn left on GA60/US 19. Travel north toward the city of Dahlonega . Travel to the first stoplight on to GA60/US 19 (business). Continue

straight through this light on Hwy. 19/60 Business. After passing Dairy Queen on the right, you will see the main NGCSU entrance on the left. DO NOT USE THIS ENTRANCE for audition or conference parking. Instead continue north six blocks to the public square. At the public square, follow the traffic circle (one-way to the right) 270 degrees around the gold museum. Exit the square heading west on Hwy 9/52 Business (West Main Street)Continue ahead two blocks, passing BB&T on the right. Turn right at the next intersection on Church Street. Continue two blocks and as the road curves to the right, watch for Dahlonega Baptist Church parking signs on the left. Go straight onto GA 60 N and follow it into the city of Dahlonega (approx. 20 mi.). Travel to the first stoplight on to GA 60/US 19 (business). Continue straight through this light on Hwy. 19/60 Business. After passing Dairy Queen on the right, you will see the main NGCSU entrance on the left. DO NOT USE THIS ENTRANCE for audition or conference parking. Instead continue north six blocks to the public square. At the public square, follow the traffic circle (one-way to the right) 270 degrees around the gold museum. Exit the square heading west on Hwy 9/52 Business (West Main Street)Continue ahead two blocks, passing BB&T on the right. Turn right at the next intersection on Church Street. Continue two blocks and as the road curves to the right, watch for Dahlonega Baptist Church parking signs on the left. After passing Dairy Queen on the right, you will see the main NGCSU entrance on the left. DO NOT USE THIS ENTRANCE for audition or conference parking. Instead continue north six blocks to the public square. At the public square, follow the traffic circle (one-way to the right) 270 degrees around the gold museum. After passing Dairy Queen on the right, you will see the main NGCSU entrance on the left. DO NOT USE THIS ENTRANCE for audition or conference parking. Instead continue north six blocks to the public square. At the public square, follow the traffic circle (one-way to the right) 270 degrees around the gold museum. 

THE FOLLOWING CHANGES IN THE GMTA AUDITIONS WERE APPROVED AT THE GMTA EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING ON AUGUST 18TH, 2007

1. To increase in number of participants advancing from the Local Auditions to GMTA Auditions:

Approved Change:

- 2. All local associations will use the designations of Outstanding Performer (OP), Award of Excellence (AE), and Honorable Mention (HM) in their local (pre-college piano) auditions.
- 3. Students will **NOT** be allowed to change from Group A to Group B for any reason.
- 4. 12th grade piano and piano concerto will always be scheduled on Saturday.
- 5. Judges will be given printed guidelines along with their schedule. The guidelines will instruct the judges to select approximately 50% of the students in each grade to receive recognition; of those 50%, 1/3 should receive OP, 1/3 AE and 1/3 HM.
- 6. The teacher fee will be increased to \$20.00 to cover the increased cost of mailing certificates, comment sheets, etc.
- 7. Since the cost of engaging orchestras has become cost prohibitive, remove the statement from GMTA Audition guidelines that refers to orchestral accompaniment for concerto winners.

Performance Anxiety Managing the Gremlins Within


This might be good time to look at some current research on music performance anxiety. There doesn't seem to be a need to describe what performance anxiety is because if someone has it, they know it without obtaining a professional diagnosis. Unfortunately dealing with anxiety is not a quick fix. Musicians seem to come at it with great individuality and verve. Carly Simon said, "I remember being onstage once when I didn't have fear: I got so scared I didn't have fear that it brought on an anxiety attack." In Psychology for Musicians: Understanding and Acquiring the Skills,

the authors group the source of anxiety into three areas: 1) the person, 2) the situation, and 3) the musical task.


Performers can also increase the proficiency of musical tasks to insure success. In Notes form the Green Room, Salmon and Meyer enlighten the reader with a greater understanding of what anxiety is and how it manifests itself. Basic stress management skills are reviewed and include skills such as progressive relaxation techniques and imagery. There are a number of great ideas discussed that you might try to calm the Gremlins (just don't put them in the blender or microwave). Telling someone to relax frequently increases one's tension. If it were that simple, anxiety would not exist. However there are simple things that you might try that can redirect your focus on the debilitating anxiety experience. Salmon and Meyer go into detail on how to make these simple techniques work as well as more labor-intensive approaches. For example, a simple suggestion is to close your eyes. There are different ways to do this and you have to move towards the sequence that facilitates relaxation. How many ways can you close your eyes...slow, fast, squinting hard so that the whole face is tense? Do you move your eyes while the eyelids are closed? "... Effective relaxation, like

musical expressiveness, mainly o f matter attending to small details (p. 174)."

For the situational



source of anxiety, we can certainly provide our students with some salves for the pain. Teachers in preparation for student performances time provide opportunities again performance. Providing a variety of practice performances in front of non-threatening audiences has proven to be a successful prescription (Kendrick et al, 1982). Greater





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frequency of performances was found in one study to be helpful in lessening performance anxiety (Linzenkirchner & Eger-Harsch, 1995). Lehrer (1987) found that when the temporal spacing of performances is increased, anxiety also increases. The more often one performs, the less likely is the event to be a unbearable incident. Frequent and positive experiences can serve as much needed positive reinforcement.

Some psychologists have used *systematic desensitization* for treating a variety of phobias. For musicians, the performer imagines the easiest performance environment available in their career. From that point, the musician works their way up to the most intense situation while employing relaxation techniques for coping. In a study by Wilson and Roland (2002), a self-directed strategy was employed that was a form of *systematic desensitization*. A brief outline of the procedure is:

- 1. Choose a known repertoire selection and assume that it will be performed.
- 2. For the performance of that selection, list as many different performance scenarios

- as possible along with the conditions for each.
- 3. Rate each situation as to the level of anxiety you might expect to experience.
- 4. Order these into a hierarchy from least stressful to most stressful situation.
- 5. Over a period of weeks or months, imagine yourself performing in these situations beginning with the least stressful. Proceed up the hierarchy where the situations move through the increasingly anxiety-inducing situations. (Lehman, 2007, p. 159)

All of these studies are discussed in *Psychology* for *Musicians: Understanding and Acquiring the Skills* along with other studies that explore additional sources of anxiety. It is stated that one out of two performers experience some form of anxiety. Anxious performers include musicians such as Artur Rubenstein, Vladimir Horowitz, Barbara Streisand and John Lennon. Some of you may be getting anxious just thinking about performance anxiety. From time to time, treat yourself to a memory lane performance where you were at your best. Remember the joy of that fine performance and let it help you gain

confidence. Frank Zappa said, "Music, in performance, is a type of sculpture. The air performance is sculpted something." There are no quick fixes but there certainly are balms for being enabled to perform in the recital hall. With anxiety under control, we are ready to sculpt something in the air, mind, and heart.





Twelve Benefits of Music Education

- 1. Early musical training helps develop brain areas involved in language and reasoning. It is thought that brain development continues for many years after birth. Recent studies have clearly indicated that musical training physically develops the part of the left side of the brain known to be involved with processing language, and can actually wire the brain's circuits in specific ways. Linking familiar songs to information can also help imprint information on young minds.
- 2. There is also a casual link between music and spatial intelligence (the ability to perceive the world accurately and to form mental pictures of things.) This kind of intelligence, by which one can visualize various elements that should go together, is critical to the sort of thinking necessary for everything from solving advanced mathematics problems to being able to pack a book-bag with everything that will be needed for the day.
- 3. Students of the arts learn to think creatively and to solve problems by

- imagining various solutions, rejecting outdated rules and assumptions. Questions about the arts do not have only one right answer.
- 4. Recent studies show that students who study the arts are more successful on standardized tests such as the SAT. The also achieve higher grades in high school.
- 5. A study of the arts provides children with an internal glimpse of other cultures and teaches them to be empathetic towards the people of these cultures. This development of compassion and empathy, as opposed to development of greed and a "me first" attitude, provides a bridge across cultural chasms that leads to respect of other races at an early age.
- 6. Students of music learn craftsmanship as they study now details are put together painstakingly and what constitutes good, as opposed to mediocre, work. These standards, when applied to a student's own work, demand a new level of excellence and require students to stretch their inner resources.
- 7. In music, a mistake is a mistake; the instrument is in tune or not, the notes are well played or not, the entrance is made or not. It is only by much hard work that a successful performance is possible.

Through music study, students learn the value of sustained effort to achieve excellence and the concrete rewards of hard work.

8. Music study enhances teamwork skills and discipline. In order for an orchestra to sound good, all players must work together harmoniously towards a single goal, the performance, and music commit to learning music, attending rehearsals, and



- practicing.
- 9. Music provides children with a means of self-expression. Now that there is relative security in the basics of existence, the challenge is to make life meaningful and to reach for a higher stage of development. Everyone needs to be in touch at some times in his life with his core, with what he is and what he feels. Self-esteem is a by-product of this self-expression.
- 10. Music study develops skills that are necessary in the workplace. It focuses on "doing, as opposed to observing, and teaches students how to perform, literally, anywhere in the world. **Employers** are looking for multidimensional workers with the sort of flexible and supple intellects that music education helps to create as described above. In the music classroom, students can also learn to better communicate and cooperate with one another.
- 11. Music performance teaches young people to conquer fear and to take risks. A little anxiety is a good thing, and something that will occur often in life. Dealing with it early often makes it less of a problem later. Risk-taking is essential if a child is to fully develop his or her potential.
- 12. An arts education exposes children to the incomparable.

NOTE 1 - NATURE OF ACTIVITIES AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

Nature of Activities: Georgia Music Teachers Association (GMTA) was founded in 1954 and incorporated in 1970 and is affiliated with Music Teachers National Association (MTNA). GMTA is a not-for-profit organization exempt from federal income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. GMTA is a corporation whose

objective is the advancement of the interest of music teachers, to deal with problems related to the training of students and to the individual growth of all musicians. This objective is undertaken through membership in the association and conventions, auditions, and publications sponsored by GMTA.

<u>Basis of accounting:</u> The financial statements of GMTA have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting and, accordingly, reflect all significant receivables, payables, and other liabilities.

<u>Revenue Recognition:</u> Revenue and expenses are recorded on the accrual basis. Revenue received for future dues, subscriptions, and conferences are deferred to the applicable year.

<u>Property, Equipment, and Depreciation:</u> Property and equipment are stated at cost. Depreciation is provided on the double-declining balance method over the estimated useful lives of the assets.

<u>Donated Services:</u> A significant portion of the Association's functions, including educational activities and programs, are conducted by unpaid volunteer officers and committees. The value of the contributed time is not reflected in the accompanying financial statements since the volunteers' time does not meet the criteria for recognition.

<u>Local area associates:</u> GMTA has authorized local associates to establish funds for their organizations. The revenues and expenditures of these organizations are not represented in these financial statements.

Basis of Presentation: Financial statement presentation follows the recommendations of the Financial Accounting Standards Board in its Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 117, Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations. Under SFAS No. 117, the Society is required to report information regarding its financial positions and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily

restricted restricted net assets, and permanently restricted net assets. The Association does not have any temporarily restricted net assets.

Note 2 - Prepaid Income:

Prepaid income represents monies received for membership dues that are properly earned in the subsequent fiscal year.

Note 3 - Restricted Award Funds:

In prior years, GMTA received contributions toward a fund reserved for composition awards. No additional contributions were received of \$200 during the 2006-07 year. Terms of gifts to the fund are that the principal be maintained as a certificate of deposit and interest earned thereon be used to fund awards. Awards were distributed in the 2006-07 year of \$150. Also in prior years GMTA received honorary and memorial funds. Additional funds of \$912.50 were received during the 2006-07 year. These funds restrict awards to the interest earned on the funds. Awards were distributed during the 2006-07 year of \$560. As of June 30, 2007, restricted funds in cash, certificates of deposit, and savings totalled \$19,529.
